From the College Archives

Mike Warren ('93) is Associate Director of Alumni and Parent Relations at the College. He does an excellent job of coordinating events on campus and communicating pertinent information to the class agents on a monthly basis. He included the following historical tidbit in his last bulletin, and because I found it interesting, I thought I'd include it in this month's letter.

Senior Bench. "Among the student traditions at Wabash is the painting of the Senior Bench. The stone bench, which sits in front of Center Hall, has been painted by virtually every campus group. Fraternities scuffle over it as pledges paint and then protect it. The Bench serves as a canvas upon which students project their message. Recently, the Bench has also served as a memorial to lost friends.

A look at the history of this monument shows that the bench is a memorial to a family that gave a great deal to the early college. The Senior Bench is really the Thomson Bench. The Thomson's were a family dedicated to education and to the young Wabash College. James and John Steele Thomson were two of the founders "kneeling in the snow" in 1832. John Steele was the third member of the faculty behind Caleb Mills and Edmund O. Hovey. The Thomson family helped to build and then sustain the Wabash College and are worthy of remembrance.

The Bench almost immediately became the sole province of the Senior Class. Woe to the lowly who dared to sit on the sacred bench. The photo below shows members of the Class of 1916 enjoying the privileges of their recent elevation. Also shown are the inscriptions now lost beneath hundreds of layers of paint. The Senior Bench sits at the center of the campus and painting it is a key tradition for generations of Wabash Men."
