### WABASH ENTERING CLASS — 2013

The 245 members of the Wabash freshmen class this fall hail from 23 states and eight countries, according to the <u>Bachelor</u> newspaper of 9/13/13. This is quite a contrast with our Class '52, which entered precisely 65 years ago this fall with about half that number. Far fewer of us came from other countries and nowhere near 23 states were represented in our freshmen class.

Moreover, "Forty percent of the freshmen [this year] were referred by Wabash alumni," according to the same article in the <u>Bachelor</u>. "Seventeen freshmen followed brothers to Wabash; four have grandfathers who are Wallies, 11 have uncles who went here, 13 have cousins who attended Wabash, and 13 are following in their fathers' footsteps by choosing Wabash College."

# R. DAVID MATHIAS, JR.

(Jan. 30, 1929 - Sept. 24, 2013)

Four years after graduating with us as a member of Beta Theta Pi, Classmate **Dave Mathias** returned to Elkhart, became President of L&J Press Corporation in 1964 through 1985, followed by Federal Press Co in 1988 through retirement in 1993. Among his services on boards of directors, both corporate and civic, are the First National Bank, Elkhart; Wilson Steel & Wire, Chicago; National Machine Tool Builders Association; The Stanley Clark School in South Bend; Furman University Parents' Council in Greenville, SC; and the Elkhart Community School Building Corporation.

On the home front, Dave is survived by a son, four daughters, 15(!) grandchildren, 3 great grandchildren, and his significant other of 30 years, Mary Louise Summers of Elkhart. He was an instrument-rated private pilot who also enjoyed golf, fly-fishing and his computer. Dave was a charter member of Elkhart's Elcona Country Club, a member of "The Oriental Order of Groundhogs, and Horseradish Club," as well as being a former member of YPO (the Young President's Organization). His obituary identifies Wabash College for remembrance in lieu of flowers.

Not until late September did Wabash learn of the demise six months earlier of Jan Daniels, beloved widow of our own Dick Daniels who authored, edited, and helped publish the record of our class in his book <u>'52@50</u>. Although unfortunately there was no obituary sent with this notification, I have learned that Jan's funeral was held at St. Dunstan's Episcopal Church in Tulsa Oklahoma, which of course is where Dick served as longtime priest of the Episcopal Diocese of Oklahoma. Together they traveled much of western Europe, favorite spots

being Salzburg, Tuscany, and a multitude of places in Great Britain, as recounted by Dick in his autobiographical contribution to '52@50.

Carole Murray passed away at age 81 in Dublin, Ohio. She and our classmate Jim first met on a blind date while Carole attended DePauw and Jim was a student at Wabash. According to her obituary, Jim "always claimed that he made a bold move to 'choose' Carole rather than the date with whom he had been set up. Jim's graduation in 1952 did not end their romance, which continued beyond Carole's college graduation in 1953, with a degree in Elementary Education." They married the following year and resided in Heidelberg, Germany while Jim was in the U.S. Army. There they gained a love of travel, which later included China, Panama, New Zealand and Scandinavia. Surviving Carol and Jim (who died 15 years ago when they resided in San Diego) are their daughter Kathleen and son Thomas plus six grandchildren.

Carole's very interesting obit concludes wisely: "A quote [giving due credit to Josh Billings, a comedian of long ago] that would resonate with Carole, the bridge aficionado, sums up her well-lived life. 'Life consists not in holding good cards but in playing those you hold well."

- *Greg Hess* was inaugurated as the 16th President of Wabash College on October 11, 2013. His immediate predecessor, Pat White, retired in June pursuant to plans announced a year earlier to do so, and then took on the interim presidency of Millikin University in Illinois, which role is no longer temporary.
- *The Monon Bell stays* on our campus per a November 16, 2013, win at Greencastle. Michael Putko threw for 296 yards and three touchdowns to lead our Little Giants to a 5th straight victory in the 120th Monon Bell Classic.

- *Hot off the press 11/15/13:* Dr. Scott E. Feller will be the new Dean of the College effective July 1, 2014. In addition to significant teaching roles and intensive scholarship while at Wabash, his posts since 2006 include Chair of the
- Chemistry Department (2006-90 and Chair of the Division of Natural Sciences and Mathematics (2009-present). He will assume the position currently held by Dr. Gary A. Philips, who will step down at the end of the current academic year and, after a sabbatical leave, will return to the classroom as Professor of Religion at Wabash.
- Another hot off the press item dated 11/25/13: Mauri A. Ditzler, a Wabash graduate where he majored in chemistry and speech, later serving as dean of the college at Wabash (1999-2005), has just been announced as the 16th president of Albion College in Michigan. He currently serves as president of Monmouth College in Illinois.
