Rounding the point we could see the harbor ahead. Just to the portside was the rock formation known as “the end of the world.” Across the bay was a light tan building with large red lettering, COSTCO. Yes it was Cabo San Lucas.

Via our cruise ship, we were touring the Baja Peninsula. We wanted this particular cruise for it called on some of the same towns we visited eight years prior while touring the area in our RV.

Our favorite town was, and still is, Loreto. It is a small town of about 14,000. It has a wonder-

ful Malecón and a tree lined street into the town plaza. There local musician and dancers awaited the crowds.

Loreto was the first Spanish colonial settlement of the on the Baja California Peninsula. While walking along the main calle, it was only natural to pause for a fish taco and a cerveza at one of local little cafes.

I believe what made Loreto so special were the clean streets, buildings while old were well cared for, and the friendly accommodating local residents.
