Maybe for our 50th we could solicit the living to write about their friends who are now gone. Surely many of the living know a lot about the deceased.

Earlier this year it occurred to me that Tom Cassell, whom I roomed with for 3 years, had been dead for 25 years. Tom died of skin cancer in 1989. He was married three times and had a son by his last wife. For many years he worked in Egypt and Saudi Arabia, so I am sure the sun there did him little good.

I decided to try to find his son, a person I knew existed but had no idea where he might be. Thanks to old age, not being able to sleep after 3AM, and fortified with a large Jack Daniels (thank you, US Army!), after a few nights on the Internet, I found Michael Cassell, age 29, working as a steelworker on nuclear submarines in Newport News, VA. (He is on Facebook) He and I will get together here in Florida in September when he is down here. He knows little of his father since he was 4 when Tom died.

By my rough count, about 20% of our class is deceased. It would be good to know about them and their lives.

As for me, after being one of the minor 'masters of the universe' in the 1980's and 90's, I was relieved of my beloved job as President of the Corporate R&D Lab at GTE in 1999 when GTE was acquired by Bell Atlantic and became Verizon. I consulted for a few years but in the past decade have essentially been the primary caretaker to my younger son Andrew who has autoimmune hepatitis and sarcoidosis (in addition to a bunch of congenital anomalies). He will need a liver transplant soon. My wife travels the world giving lectures on flower arranging for

pay (!) and I stay home and care for our son. As I write, my wife is in Ireland. It is total role reversal from when I was a corporate wienie.

We are all flying to Sydney in November and are taking a 2 week cruise around New Zealand on Holland America Lines. Feel free to come along.

Annual Giving

For the fiscal year just ended, the Class of 1967 had 92 donors (54.8%) as compared to 86 donors (50.3%) a year ago. Many thanks to all of you who made contributions. A few of the highlights for the year:

- 5,208 alumni, parents, and friends made gifts to the Annual Fund for \$3,271,804. The FY14 Annual Fund dollar total is the second highest unrestricted dollar total in the College's history.
- 4,538 alumni made gifts to the College (both Annual Fund and restricted gifts). This is 377 more alumni donors than FY13. This was the fourth consecutive year for the College to realize an increase in the number of alumni donors. This is the highest number of alumni donors in a single fiscal year, breaking the previous FY02 record of 4,314.
- Alumni participation was at 40.15% in FY14 versus 37.24% in FY13 and 35.06% in FY12. FY14 is the first year above 40% alumni participation since FY03.
- There were 44 classes that finished FY14 ahead of FY13 in alumni donors with an increase of at least one donor.
- Of the top 10 classes in terms of alumni participation, 9 of the top 10 were at 50% or more in alumni participation; there were 21 classes above the average rate of 40.2%.
- The Class of 1969, celebrating their 45th reunion, had the highest number of alumni donors of any class with 106 contributors.
- The Class of 1961 led all classes in alumni participation with 59.5%.
- For the 430 Campaign on 4/30/14, one day giving challenge, every class since 1948 had at least on alumni donor and every class from 1961-2017 had 10 or more alumni donors.

Obviously we have started a new fiscal year, so any contributions for this year will be welcomed.
