Athletics

Wabash Wins Fifth Straight NCAC Title

The Wabash track and field team won its record-tying fifth straight North Coast Athletic Conference Championship Saturday. Denison won five straight from 1985-89 as did Allegheny from 2003-07.

The Little Giants finished with 256.50 points, followed by Ohio Wesleyan at 193 and DePauw at 80. Oberlin (66.50), Wittenberg (65), Allegheny (61), Denison (41), Wooster (30), and Kenyon (22) rounded out the NCAC field.

"This is special because there are only two other programs that have won five consecutive men's outdoor titles," Wabash head coach <u>Clyde Morgan</u> said. "That's pretty elite company to join, which makes the accomplishment pretty special. But we've really gone into each season focused on winning that title, not what we did last year. I'm not really sure this accomplishment will hit the guys until sometime this summer. We'll go right from this meet to competing at final qualifying meets before heading to nationals, so there's not really much time to take this in until after the season ends the last weekend in May. There's just not time to reflect on the past few years until the season is over. It will probably hit our alumni who have been part of the first few titles and our seniors who will graduate with the conference title having only been at Wabash during their careers in many different ways. We did exactly what we wanted to do --- not focus on the title but to have a blast, be high energy, get your point and just take things event by event," Morgan said. "That's been our philosophy here since I've been coaching."

Wabash won its fifth straight indoor title earlier this season to add to its dominance in of the sport in the NCAC over

the last half decade. Wabash scored 50 athletes with 22 earning All-NCAC honors this season by finishing in the top three of their events. The Little Giant coaching staff was also honored as the NCAC Coaching Staff of the Year.

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4.22 Day of Giving

As Earl mentioned last month, this was a terrific day for fundraising. We'd like to share this note from Joe Klen:

Friends,

It has been a little over two weeks (*Ed. note – this was sent to us a few weeks ago.*) since we concluded our Go for 2 on 4.22 Day of Giving for Wabash College. Late yesterday, we completed all of the gift processing work for gifts made as part of the day. We have spent some time today analyzing all of the data. I am excited to be able to share with you a first look at some of the final results.

Gifts and Donors

- -2,848 gifts were made on 4.22.
- -2,561 unique donors were part of the day. This includes 1,636 alumni, 533 current students, 155 parents, and more than 150 faculty and staff.
- -1,165 people renewed their support of Wabash and made their first gift of the 2014-2015 fiscal year on 4.22.
- -383 current students made their first gift **EVER** to Wabash on 4.22.
- -147 other people made their first gift **EVER** to Wabash on 4.22

Dollars

- -\$505.677 raised on 4.22.
- -83% of the dollars on the day were allocated to the Annual Fund.

Class Statistics

- -The Class of 2004 led all alumni classes for the second year in a row with $\underline{90}$ donors on 4.22 (up from 62 last year on 4/30).
- -The Classes of 2011 (56), 1991 (51), 2013 (49), and 2003 (47) rounded out the top five alumni classes for the highest number of donors by an alumni class on 4.22.
- -10 alumni classes had more than 40 alumni give on the day.
- **-Every** class between 1959 and 2018 had 10 or more donors.
- -Every class since 1949 had at least two donors.
- -The Class of 2018 (freshmen) led the four undergraduate classes with 157 students making a gift (narrowly beating the Class of 2015 who had 153 seniors give on 4.22).

Affinity Challenges

- -There were 47 affinity challenges by individuals or groups.
- -Nearly 1,400 gifts were attached to affinity challenges (some applied two codes to a single gift).
- -Top Affinity Challenges with more than 50 codes entered:

We will be sending updated class giving statistics to Class Agents early next week.

Starting on Monday (5/11), our office will be in touch with those individuals or groups who launched Affinity Challenges on 4.22.

Again, on behalf of all of us in the Advancement Office, I thank you for the many ways you helped make 4.22 another great Day of Giving for Wabash College!
