Dear Old Wabash

I typically read the letters from other class agents to see how others view their Wabash experience and how Wabash has influenced their lives. I found these comments in a recent 1977 class letter, from Greg Birk and Herm Haffner:

"While much has changed at Wabash—new buildings, new courses, new sport (lacrosse), and the names of the faculty and students are different, the core of Wabash is unchanged. It continues to bring out the best of the men who enroll and does graduate men who think critically, act responsibly, lead effectively, and live humanely. I am typically on 30-50 different college campuses around the world every year. There are many, many great colleges and universities that all blend together, but there is still only one Wabash with the special environment this is so conducive for high achievement, high expectations, superior outcomes, lasting relationships, a tradition of excellence, intense pride, superior teaching, and 24/7 learning. I know that the vast majority of us share this depiction of Wabash. I also know that this view is difficult for most non-Wabash people to understand. Even my own family members still harass me about going to an all-male college and being gung-ho about things "Wabash", but I believe part of their teasing is because their college experiences were neither as intense nor as satisfying as mine was at Wabash.

Here is a heart-warming story from Tom Runge, regarding the Glee Club's recent trip:

"Last week the Glee Club started off several of their concerts with the National Anthem. To the Grunge, it always fits, no matter the venue or assembled group. At the UT Elementary School (a charter school), the kids loved it. I caught a glimpse out of the corner of my eye at one young lady in particular. As soon as the Glee Club started singing, she rose to her feet and stood at attention. Then several times throughout, she would salute. There's a part of me that wondered if a parent or parents were/are in the Service. I didn't ask and it would not have mattered. What matters, I think, is that she understood the importance of the Anthem in her own, very special, way.

It reminds me that patriotism is always in style and also the tremendous impact our guys have on others when they are out and about. I saw it often as the Glee Club traveled from the Alamo to Vista Ridge High School to the retirement community at Longhorn Village. These guys are the face of Wabash!"

National News

Wabash ROI Among Nation's Best

Wabash College ranked 50th nationally in the 2015 *PayScale.com* ROI report, a ranking released today of the best return on investment in higher education.

Wabash graduates can expect to earn more than \$597,000 more than a high school graduate over a 20-year period following degree completion. That figure placed Wabash in the top four percent nationally of the 1,223 schools ranked for providing the best monetary return through a combination of low cost of attendance and a high earnings potential for alumni.

Based on this ranking, Wabash graduates earn more than \$363,000 more over a 20-year period than the college graduate median, which breaks down to better than \$18,000 annually. "Our young men don't choose between science and art, or between academics and athletics, but instead combine elements of college life that many think are in opposition to each other," said Dr. Scott E. Feller, Dean of the College. "Similarly, the data from *PayScale* show that a student choosing Wabash does not have to decide between a liberal arts education and financial success."

Wabash was one of three liberal arts schools in the top 50. **Wabash and Rose-Hulman** were the only Indiana higher education institutions to appear in *PayScale's* top-50 slots, outdistancing **Purdue** (53rd), **Notre Dame** (75th), **Indiana** (397th), and the Wabash placement also topped all other Great Lakes College Association members listed. **DePauw ranked** (677th).

Further, Wabash's four-year full cost of attendance (before any merit or financial aid), reported as \$175,900, is the third lowest of all private schools ranked in the top 100. Wabash was joined by National Liberal Arts Colleges Harvey Mudd and Lafayette in the top 50.

"For generations, Wabash has offered young men a rich liberal arts education that is both attainable and respected in the marketplace," said Preston Bost, professor of psychology and director of institutional research. "The return-on-investment analysis by PayScale is a rigorously quantitative way of representing the stories we hear every day from graduates who credit Wabash with helping them succeed."

The *PayScale* rankings are determined by the difference between the 20-year median pay for a bachelor's degree recipient and the 24-year median pay for a high school graduate minus the cost of attendance.

Athletics

There is some terrific news on the recent successes of the indoor track and field and wrestling teams.

Wabash captured its fifth consecutive North Coast Athletic Conference Men's **Track and Field** Championship on March 7. Wabash finished with 230.83 points, with Ohio Wesleyan taking second with 197.83 points. Wittenberg finished third (74), followed by DePauw (55), Oberlin (49.33), and Allegheny (38). Kenyon and

Denison tied for seventh with 21 points apiece, while Wooster took ninth with 14 points. Wabash was also honored as the Coaching Staff of the Year by the NCAC. The victory matches the five straight titles won by Allegheny from 2003 to 2007.

"We tell the guys every year that one point can make a difference, so get your point," Wabash head coach <u>Clyde Morgan</u> said. "This year it was particularly true throughout the meet. Ohio Wesleyan was with us step for step. This was a true team victory. Everyone contributed to this championship."

The **wrestling** team finished 3rd at the D3 national tournament on March 13-14 with four All-Americans -- two national champions, one runner-up, and one 7th place finisher. Among the records set were three brothers (Lefever) in the NCAA tournament in the same year and all three wrestling to be a national champion!

"Our third-place finish this year was our break through as a team," Wabash head coach <u>Brian Anderson</u> said. "It lets the guys know it can be done, to bring home a team trophy. Our entire program was in the stands and got to see our qualifiers get it done this weekend, I know many of our guys in the stands will work that much harder this summer to make sure they are the ones at nationals next year. Recruiting is a huge step in this process too; we want guys who want to be pushed in the classroom and get an unbelievable education, while getting a first class wrestling experience and to be on a team with realistic goals of winning a national title. I am extremely proud of the entire program and thankful for all the help of the parents, coaches, administration and alumni gave to us this year; they can't be thanked enough and are a huge reason our program is where it is today."
