From global travelin' Carl "Buzz" Madsen:

Jim,

Thanks! Good class letter! We're in Copenhagen spending time with my cousins and headed to the Danish island of Bornholm this afternoon to visit the land of my ancestors. Spent most of April and May at our home in Domme, France. We were invited by neighbors to learn how to play Petanque and played twice a week at the village Esplanade overlooking the Dordogne River. Steph and I were honored to be invited to join "La Petanque Dommoise," the village Petanque association.

So, I asked Buzz about Petanque, and he informs:

Here is one of Bornholm's round churches.



Petanque is like bocci but different. The surface of the playing area is not groomed and points go to the balls closest to the "cochonnet"--a small ball (piglet) thrown by the team which won the last round. If the cochonnet is struck during play, the play continues with the goal still being to roll balls closest to the cochonnet's new position. Players are either pointers or shooters; pointers try to get their ball close to the cochonnet; shooters try to knock opponents balls into East Jesus. Balls are rolled underhand with the palm

toward the player to achieve a backspin. So, being ungroomed, the ball might hit a rock, die in a sandy spot or roll away unexpectedly. Unlike horseshoes, the target can move from one moment to the next. And, except for the first pointers' rolls, there is no orderly rotation of players depending on whether the next roll requires a shooter or pointer.

Check my Facebook posts for pictures. We're now on the island of Bornholm from which my grandparents emigrated 135 or so years ago. Interestingly, the Germans did not want to surrender to the Russians at the end of WWII here. They wanted to surrender to the British. So, the Russians bombed the island, destroyed hundreds of homes, and occupied the island until April,1946. The islanders didn't care much for the Swedes, hated the Germans, but still have an especially strong animosity toward the Russians. They're now dealing with the refugee crisis in the Middle East and have not entirely come to grips with their new neighbors.

Wabash decathletes <u>Matthew Dickerson Jr.</u> and <u>Adam Wadlington</u> posted top-15 finishes Friday at the 2016 NCAA Division III Outdoor Track and Field Championships. Dickerson scored 6,418 points to place 10th overall. Wadlington, seeded 19th entering the meet, tallied 6,213 points to place 14th among the field of 20 competitors. Dickerson finished 126 short of his school-record total of 6,544 points and 149 points away from eighth-place finisher Tobias Muellers from Williams College (6,567).

#WabashProud Surpasses \$600,000

Wabash men and the Wabash community were more than just #WabashProud during the April 27 Day of Giving. If you haven't yet, please consider supporting Wabash. The college fiscal year ended on June 30 and the Class of 1968 giving rate was 83/173, which is an excellent 48%. Thanks for stepping up, guys!

"As you all begin a new fiscal year, I am pleased to report to you the final Annual Fund and Class Giving statistics for the 2015-2016 fiscal year (FY16) that ended on June 30, 2016. Here are a few highlights:

• 5,283 alumni, parents, and friends made gifts to the Annual Fund for \$3,129,507.

- 4,908 alumni made gifts to the College (both Annual Fund and restricted gifts). This total is a *new record for the number of alumni donors in a single year* and is 231 more alumni donors than last year. This was the sixth consecutive year for the College to realize an increase in the number of alumni donors.
- Alumni participation was at 42.4%, which is up from 41.0% last year and 40.2% in FY14. "
