Facts and Figures

Endowment: As of March 31, 2014, the value of Wabash's endowment was approximately \$345 million, which places Wabash among the highest colleges in the nation in per-student endowment.

Financial Aid: Approximately 90 percent of students receive some form of student aid.

Tuition and Fees: For the 2014-2015 academic year, tuition is \$37,100. Residence Hall room charges are \$4,530 per year (fees vary based on choice of living unit). Meal charges vary by meal plan, including \$4,600 (19 weekly meals) and \$4,200 (15 meals). The required Student Activity Fee is \$450 and there is a \$200 Student Health Center fee.

Wabash's 902 male students come from approximately 32 states and about 12 foreign countries; about 70 percent of the students are from Indiana. Test scores range from the middle 50 percent of entering freshmen: SAT critical reading 500-610, SAT math 530-640, and SAT writing 480-590, and average composite ACT is 25. Each year, approximately 250 freshmen students enroll.

Faculty: In 2013, 98 percent of the faculty members at Wabash hold a Ph.D. or equivalent terminal degree. Wabash's special strength lies with a faculty dedicated to teaching undergraduate students.

Student/Faculty Ratio: Wabash maintains a student/faculty ratio of 11/1 or lower and the average class size is 13.

Soccer, anyone? Sophomore goalkeeper Dayton Jennings recorded 11 saves and two shutouts in a record-setting week for Wabash soccer. His efforts earned him North Coast Athletic Conference Men's Soccer Player of the Week honors.



Also, the 6-0 football team is ranked #10 in Division III.
