

Hi Jim, I have just returned from NYC and my cancer treatments there. Until I had to go there last month, I was making good progress in getting my books finished. Since I have gotten back this week, I have finally accepted that at the ripe old age of 70, I am completely retired from all my long time professional activities. Now, I am turning all my attention to my books and their sorely belated publication.

Amazon wants to pick me up under their imprint to help them compete with James Patterson and Little Brown's new market thrust with the reinvented Novella format from Patterson called "BookShots." However,I have turned them down for two reasons. First, I do not want the pressure that comes from signing with a major publishing house and having to produce under their imprint. That's not good for my health. Second, they could not assure me that even one of my books would get published before the end of the year. That is unfortunate since I realistically do not know how much time I have left.

So, I have established my own imprint and am going to publish my books as eBooks through Kindle Direct Publishing instead. I am planning to ride Patterson's coat tails if possible with my own version of his concept called SnapBooks. This is because I am not only doing the same thing he is today, but the 20 or so books that I have drafted over the last decade or so have already been authored in that same new format of his.

Now, my Dad,who is a Professor Emeritus in English from George Mason University, is helping me by doing the down and dirty deep editing, at least for the first books until I can afford a respectable and reliable editor for my imprint.

I expect that the first book in the "We Spy!" SnapBook Series will be published by Friday next week as will the web site for my company, SnapBook Press, Inc.

I asked Bruce more about his situation and he replied:

Actually, I am not doing chemo. I am doing hormone therapy right now in NYC at the Cornell Medical Center to buy time. I am waiting for the Weill Institute up in Ithaca to finish engineering a "virus" to insert into my system. They are using my genome to do this. The virus breaks down the "shell" that all cancer cells have to remain invisible to your lymph system, Once that is gone, the lymph system attacks the cancer cells and removes them. This has worked elsewhere in clinical trials such as the one that I am in. So, I am hopeful.
