Survey Confirms Wabash Students Are More Engaged In Academic Pursuits Than Most Students Nationwide

Wabash students are engaged in academics and campus life. We knew that in 1971, and it is comforting to know as 60-year-old somethings that they are still today. But neutral investigators have confirmed our personal experiences.

In an annual survey of more than 360,000 college freshmen and seniors in 627 American colleges, the level of engagement of Wabash men remains near the top in the country and near the top of peer institutions in the Great Lakes region.

The survey, 2009 National Assessment of Student Engagement (NSSE), questioned students in five categories: (1) level of academic challenge, (2) active and collaborative learning, (3) student-faculty interaction, (4) enriching education experience, and (5) supportive campus environment.

Here is just a tiny sampling.

- 97% of Wabash freshmen felt the college placed substantial emphasis on academics.

- 63% of Wabash freshmen frequently worked harder than they thought they could to meet faculty expectations.

- 26% of Wabash freshmen wrote more than 10 papers between 5 and 19 pages and 27% wrote a paper more than 20 pages.

- 45% of Wabash seniors did research with a faculty member.

- 86% of Wabash seniors would choose Wabash again if they could start their college career over.

Unlike rankings, which often have commercial motives, this survey does not. It confirms that Wabash is an excellent place for education where people matter.

These results should be further impetus for each of us to keep our school strong by encouraging young men to enroll at Wabash. A referral is easy, important, and rewarding. Interesting New IM "Sport"—Recycling. The IM Recycling competition will begin February 4 and run to the month's end. The winning living unit will get 24 points.

Bins and bags will be distributed early next week, which will be collected twice a week, Monday and Thursday. I am not sure how this contest will be scored, but it may be one sport where trash talking is encouraged.

First Generation Students. Wabash still attracts a large number of first generation students. It is applying for a grant to help attract and keep those students. For this purpose, a "first generation student" is a student neither of whose parents completed college. How many of our classmates were first generation students? Wabash Scores High In Rankings. *The Princeton Review,* which is in partnership with *USA Today,* has recently named Wabash as one of the 50 best values in private colleges. Wabash is the only Indiana institution to be named to the Top 40 of Forbes.com's Best Colleges and Best Buys College lists for 2009.

The Princeton Review surveys administrators and students at more than 650 public and private colleges and universities on more than 30 factors in academics, cost of attendance, and financial aid. It observed Wabash's "solid reputation" and "rigorous academic programs" and spotlighted Wabash's Honor Scholar Weekend for merit-based scholarships.

The *Forbes.com* rankings are done in conjunction with the Center for College Affordability and Productivity. Forbes focuses on student opinion while considering other factors such as post-graduate success and the estimated student debt after four years.

Business Initiative. Wabash is starting a Business Leaders Program to deliver a comprehensive introduction to the world of business. It will combine academic courses with experiential learning. This is not a business major, however.

The program will include a business-related internship. Under this program, the college may have grant money to help to pay the intern. This is a good deal for the employer, the student, and the college. For more information, please contact me or Angie Cook-Smith at the college.

Basketball Team On A Roll. After a slow start, the Little Giants have won eight of their last nine games to boost their season record to 12-6 and its conference record to 7-3. Wabash lost an early season contest at DePauw but pummeled the Tigers, 72-50 in Crawfordsville in a December re-match. They defeated a tough Wittenberg team (13-3) on January 20.

Wrestling & Swimming. It is hard to determine how these teams are doing because of various meets. The wrestling team seems to be doing well, having finished second in a 11-school tourney at North Central (Chicago) and third out of 14 teams at Elmhurst College (Illinois) on January 17. The swimming team does not seem to being as well, but it is heading toward the conference tourney, February 10-13.

Faculty Cut-Backs. Approximately 32 faculty or staff have accepted early retirement packages offered because of the recession. The departures will not occur all at once. The college is also reducing budgets, but the idea is to do more with less.

She was on the US Equestrian Team's long list a few years ago and is presently competing at some stratospheric level in Dressage. Zosia, her middle daughter, is midway through her degree in Veterinary Medicine at the University of Pennsylvania. And her youngest, Maxine, will graduate from Princeton this year.

Keith Nelson. "I have continued to work in public service in Illinois state government. After 16 years with the IL Dept of Corrections (including "spending time" as a Warden. I have been working for the IL Dept. of Human Services for 9 years. I have worked in the Division of Mental Health as an administrator in our Forensic Division (patients unable to stand trial..UST and those not-guilty-by-reason-of insanity...NGRI.) Among various duties, I am responsible for monitoring approx 200 individuals who are not institutionalized, but are either outpatients or conditionally released from court-ordered secure placement in a forensic facility.

I remain a Senior Public Service Administrator in "rank" and as such am still subject for re-appointment every 4 yrs. Fortunately, I have resisted my "radical" impulses and remain employed despite a decreasing number of similarly titled employees in IL crushing economic environment.
