Sad News from the College: Long-time Wabash Professor **Richard Strawn** passed away recently at the age of 91. Dr. Strawn taught French, Linguistics, and Music to Wabash students (including me!) over four decades, beginning in 1951until his retirement in 1987, and remained a vibrant part of the College's community throughout his life.

Recently, **Bob Ivancevich** was honored by his Land O' Lakes (WI) community for his vision and hard work as President of the local Arts Center and Group... "Our dream was to raise money to buy this (local) building and to have a cooperative gallery there, artistry, and to support the arts in the community... and look how far we've come," said Bob at the ceremony. And...he accomplished his goal. Now he's retiring and he's passing the leadership on. "Board members honored Ivan by presenting a bench with his name engraved on it." Nice work, Ivan.

Ivan has also been very good about keeping me up to date about news from other classmates, including **Rev. Pierce Klemmt** (who is slowly moving from fulltime ministry to part-time lecturing...I hope I got that right, Pierce!), **Paul Gojkovich** and **John Failey.** We all need people in the Class to keep us up to date on others. *Please* send notes to me so I can share with everyone.

Received an interesting a truly remarkable email from **Rod Kenley.** I include a slightly edited excerpt below:

"I had an interesting experience this fall. My company (Aethlon Medical) makes a blood filtration device that extracts viruses from circulation. It is used much like an artificial kidney (dialyzer) in dialysis... In early October, I was contacted on a Saturday by a nephrologist in Frankfurt Germany who I didn't know. He explained that he was a member of a patient care team that had just received a physician evacuated from Sierra Leone who had contracted Ebola. This nephrologist (Dr. Koch), who had become familiar with our device from reading about it in the literature asked me if there was any way they could get their hands on some to use as a clinical intervention with this Ebola patient."

"We treated the patient for six and a half hours. Blood samples taken before and after the therapy indicated four days later, no virus could be detected in the patient's plasma and he ultimately recovered and returned home to Africa. A science reporter from Time magazine called for an interview and the doctor and I obliged which led, two weeks later, to our device being included in their annual "Genius" issue as one of the top 25 best inventions of 2014."

Rod went on to say that he and his team continue to help others in many countries to improve the devices to treat Ebola. Tim ended his letter saying: "I guess it's good news that the U.S. has not had any Ebola patients since (earlier episodes) but it has certainly been a whirlwind past 5 months for yours truly".

Received a nice note from **John Failey.** He and wife Jill continue to reside in Indy, but they seem to travel all over the world on a fairly consistent basis, which is great! Here's his note:

"I went to NYC recently to attend the Chamber Music America National Conference. Lots of doings and sessions appropriate to concert presenters like Ensemble Music Society, time to meet with artist managers to discuss future season stuff and hear showcase concerts and meet the musicians first hand. I like to do this every few years and always learn a lot." Keep it going, John! **Kim Ebert** has been re-elected as managing shareholder of Ogletree Deakins, one of the largest labor and employment law firms representing management. Kim has served as Ogletree Deakins' managing shareholder since 2010. In the last year under Kim's leadership, Ogletree Deakins added two offices – in Mexico City and Milwaukee – increasing its footprint to 47 offices across the U.S., in Europe, and in Mexico.

"Dear Rick,

I am writing to tell you that my husband of 42 years Dr Jim Hambidge passed away on June 4, 2014 at Vanderbilt Medical Center following the sudden and unexpected return of Mantle Cell Lymphoma. He had undergone what was thought to be a successful stem cell transplant on Dec 6, 2013 and returned to his internal medicine practice in Evansville on Apr 1, 2014. Jim was honored as St. Mary's Medical Center 2014 Physician of the Year on May 3."

"I would appreciate very much your including this in your class notes. He was mentioned in the obituary of the *Wabash* magazine. I did not send any information to Wabash and would not have known that was printed if it had not been for a very kind letter that I received from Skip Burhans."

Though I coach at our alma mater's arch rival now, I'll always remember and always be truly thankful for such a wonderful brotherhood of men who go above and beyond for every cause.
