Homecoming Report

At Homecoming, the Class Agents and board members of the National Association of Wabash Men were able to see and hear about a great example of some things at Wabash that have changed for the good as well as to be reminded of what has not changed.

Wabash Students - Ready for Anything

Presentations at Homecoming demonstrated that Wabash continues to prepare men to be leaders ready for anything. The College sign now reads **"The Liberal Arts College for Men."**

At Homecoming, the Class Agents heard presentations about cutting edge opportunities Wabash is bringing to its students to supplement the traditional classroom course work. The Center for Innovation, Business & Entrepreneurship (CIBE), which operates under a \$1 million grant from the Lilly Endowment, provides opportunities for Wabash students to learn and explore careers in business, entrepreneurship and leadership. It is a program open to all majors and helps Wabash students tell their stories to recruiters. The students who have participated in CIBE programs

stay at Wabash and graduate at a rate of over 90% (97% for students who have had internships), which is well above the overall 68% graduation rate. The Wabash Democracy & Public Discourse Initiative (WIPD) equips students to stimulate and lead productive conversations in communities to solve problems. The Class Agents learned about the innovative programs Wabash is offering in the digital arts. The Wabash Global Health Initiative seeks "To transform the lives of students through global public health education, investigation and service and in so doing to effect positive change in underserved communities globally." The presentation of the Initiative featured a video made by Ryan Horner '15, an English major (and now in grad school) and what his participation in this program meant to him. Ryan's video demonstrated that Wabash students in all of the majors at Wabash are taking advantage of these programs that will help them be prepared to demonstrate how Wabash prepares it graduates to be ready for anything.²

On the Thursday of Homecoming, Eboo Patel, founder of the Interfaith Youth Core, visited Wabash and spent most of the day meeting with students and then gave a talk in the Chapel that evening. He began his address by thanking Professor Ray Williams, who attended the talk, for essentially starting the field interfaith study, cooperation and leadership, in recognition of Dr. Williams' research and engagement with the Swaminaryan community. Mr. Patel gave a great talk and frequently referenced his discussions with Wabash students during the day and how impressed he was with their ability to discuss multi-faith issues and leadership. He shared his sense that Wabash was a special college that expected more for its students. He used the phrase that Wabash "places a crown above their heads" a few times to illustrate the high aspiration that Wabash holds for its students and their place in the world.

Wabash Sports

Many of you no doubt were following the Little Giant football team that completed an undefeated regular season, including a seventh consecutive win over a very good DePauw team, and a trip to the "Elite Eight" in the Division III playoff. I had the "pleasure" (as did Lou Fenoglio) of seeing graduating senior running back Mason Zurek (an Academic All-American)

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run for a Wabash record 312 in the first round of the playoffs at home against Albion (breaking his record of 278 yards the prior week against DePauw). It probably snowed harder at that home game than any day for a Wabash football game since the first round of the playoffs our freshman year (and that game was against St. John's in Minnesota). The playoff game against Albion and the second round against Thomas More demonstrate Wabash Always Fights and that always means always. The first game could have been lost and the second one ranked with Wabash's all time come backs. Mason and Coach Raeburn very rightly received all NCAC honors as player and coach of the year, respectively.



The soccer team had a good season and only loses one senior to graduation. Wabash placed 8th for the first top 10 finish in the Division III Men's Cross Country Championship since 1995. Wrestling is too no surprise, off to a very good start. Swimming has also started off well. In addition to hearing about the success on the field, on the mat and in the pool, it is good to see a number of Wabash athletes recognized as Academic All Americans.
