## THE LIBERAL ARTS PLUS



Can you imagine what we could have done with the resources available to Wabash students today? For instance, President Hess has established four <u>Liberal Arts PLUS</u> initiatives. LA+ provides students with focused training and experience in various sectors:

- Democracy & Public Discourse
- Global Health
- <u>Digital Arts & Human Values</u>
- <u>Center for Innovation, Business & Entrepreneurship</u> (That's the one I run.)

The CIBE is funded by a very generous grant from the Lilly Endowment Inc. Got to love Lilly! This is my second year setting up and running the CIBE. I never thought I would be

back working at Wabash, but after 20+ years at marketing and consulting firms around the world, I am having an amazing time. The only drawback is actually living in Crawfordville again.

What is the CIBE? It's a resource to help support students as they engage in internships, immersive experiences, entrepreneurship, and management opportunities during their time at Wabash. CIBE programs give students from all majors experiences where they will apply their Wabash education to solving real-world problems.

This year, the CIBE alone will reach 30% of students, provide 70 paid internships, 3 week-long immersion programs, 3 week-long business fundamentals programs, and a 7-week class in entrepreneurship where the students are paid to learn. Again, where were these programs when we were students?

The CIBE and other LA+ initiatives focuses on a 4-step process to enhance a student's liberal arts education and experience:

- 1. We get students the Wabash classroom education they need to have a rock-solid understanding of topics. From Deliberations to Biology to the summer <u>Liberal Arts Bridges to Business (LABB) Program</u>, each of these build student's knowledge base for Step 2.
- 2. We place students into immersion programs during the academic year or breaks to give them an extra edge and deep-dive into a topic like marketing, health care, finance, decision-making or 3D printing.
- 3. We work with students to help them find a meaningful internship experience where they can put Steps 1 and 2 to work, making a difference for a company, nonprofit, or government agency.
- 4. We put students to work on campus, using Steps 1, 2, and 3 to make a difference on campus and in the larger community. This could be performing data analysis for the Registrar's office, scribing for the public health clinic physician, or developing a bike share program for Crawfordsville.

Why do we take this approach? Because we know in the end our students are going to have an amazing story to tell about how they have already put their Wabash education to work, changing the world.

And it pays off. Last May, 29 students graduated in the Class of 2015, and by April 1, 96% of them had full-time job offers, reporting that they talked specifically about their CIBE experiences in their interviews. The Liberal Arts PLUS is making a difference for students.

Next time you're on campus, I invite you to stop by <u>Arnold House</u>, and you can see the CIBE at work.
