News You Can Use:

New Cross Country Coach: Roger Busch '96 succeeds the affable and accomplished Coach Johnson who had guided the cross country program since 1971. Busch was an eight-time letterman, a leader of the Wabash cross country teams that finished third and fourth at the national championships, an All-American in both track and cross country, and was inducted into the Wabash Athletics Hall of Fame in 2001.

Retirements:

Professor of Theater **Jim Fisher** retired from Wabash after 29 years and will return to his alma mater at UNC-Greensboro. Fisher was awarded the 2007 Betty Jean Jones Award by the American Theater and Drama Society (ATDS), which is the highest honor presented to individual members. He served as department chair from 1980 through 1991 and from 1995 through 1997, and was also named the Indiana Theater Person of the Year in 1996.

Professor of English **Don Herring** also retired. Herring came to Wabash in 1971 and served as the English Department Chair, Division Chair, and Dean of the College through much of the 1990s.

Phi Beta Kappa chooses Bash: The college garnered a prestigious designation as one of eleven institutes of higher learning selected by the Phi Beta Kappa society to participate in "Deliberation about Things That Matter," a series for teaching and learning deliberative skills. I suspect the Center for Inquiry (established after our graduation) as a research center for a liberal arts education was instrumental in the College's selection.

Goodbye Tommy's: A downtown fire destroyed Tommy's this spring.

College Awards:

Wabash College is the nation's 6th best value private college according to *The Princeton Review*. Wabash ranked in the top ten in the following categories "Professors make Themselves Accessible", "School Runs Like Butter", "Students Happy with Financial Aid", "Everyone Plays Intramural Sports", "Major Frat and Sorority Scene", and "Jock Schools".

"Move over Padgett": Wabash senior Patrick Millikan was one of 270 male studentathletes to receive the prestigious NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship from among the 219,000 eligible NCAA athletes. Millikan is the 15th Wabash student-athlete to receive an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship joining our own Bill Padgett '92.

Debate Team Rocks: The Parliamentary debate team represented Wabash well this year at the National Championships. There was one first place finish, along with third, fourth, and fifths in several categories. In the team competition, Wabash placed sixth overall.

MXI Honors: the Malcolm X Institute presented the inaugural Jasmine Robinson Pioneer Award to Indiana Historical Society Senior Archivist Wilma Moore. The award honors Wabash's first African American employee.

Wallies in the News:

Rick Sasso, MD: Look for the forthcoming Wabash Notes profile of the Indianapolis neurosurgeon that was the first surgeon in the U.S. to perform artificial disc replacement surgery in both the cervical and lumbar regions of the spine and owns multiple patents for surgical techniques and tools.

Scott Dreher: A San Diego attorney who does pro bono representation as an advocate for the homeless won a case against the city securing the right of the homeless to sleep on the street.

Geoff Lambert: The Wabash junior placed second at the 800- meter NCAA Div III National Championships earning his second All-American award.

President of Lilly Endowment Inc. Clay Robbins '79 was inducted into the Indiana Academy. Membership in the academy is one of the most prestigious honors conferred upon a Hoosier, based upon the recognition of the individual's lifetime achievements by Indiana's 31 independent colleges and universities.

Report from the Buildings and Grounds Committee: The committee is assessing the capability of developing new soccer and baseball fields and the cost effectiveness of adding synthetic playing surfaces for football, baseball, and soccer. The college assumed control of fraternity maintenance this past year. Overall, fraternity houses through routine inspections are in better shape, but are not achieving the standard set by the College for cleanliness.

The renovation of the old TKE house, which will become an independent residence hall, is on schedule for completion this summer. Work has begun on the new TKE house which will be located upon the old Sigma Chi house. A two-phase renovation of Delta Tau Delta will begin this summer and continue in the summer of 2008.
