DANE NUTTY ON TAKING THE LEAD AT AN INDIANA NON-PROFIT

07R: We've been out of Wabash for about eight years now. Give us a little background on where you've been since graduation leading up to your leadership role with the Indianapolis Police Foundation.

After Wabash, I built my career in the nonprofit healthcare industry and completed my Masters in Health Administration at the Fairbanks School of Public Health at IUPUI. My first major project was helping to launch the Indiana Mothers' Milk Bank, a nonprofit human milk bank under the umbrella of Indiana University Health (then Clarian Health). After serving as Program Manager of the small nonprofit for 3 years ... I was recruited by a former colleague to help turn around a struggling federally-funded grant program through the Marion County Public Health Department. [Most recently], I was asked to help lead the launch of the Indianapolis Police Foundation, a new nonprofit organization aiming to raise funds and community awareness for our local law enforcement. Having married a police officer, I knew firsthand the gaps that existed between what public budgets allowed and the needs to address public safety issues in our community. The individual and business communities want to help; they were just unsure about how to best engage.

07R: Tell us a little about the IPF and the role you see it playing in the community.

The Indianapolis Police Foundation (IPF) is the first organization of its kind here in the Central Indiana area and has a 3-fold mission to:

- a. Provide supplemental resources for officers in the line of duty;*
- b. Provide support and resources for traumatically injured officers and their families; and*
- c. Build more positive, meaningful police-community relationships.*

IPF is led by a community Board of Directors representing law enforcement and the business community. We are thankful for the support of our two Founding Sponsors – the Indianapolis Colts and the Pacers Foundation. As we grow our brand, we aim to identify needs – whether hard resources for officers in the line of duty or community-based programs that engage police and youth – and help meet those needs through targeted fundraising or building capacity of evidence-based programs.

IPF's first major project was providing Gunshot Trauma Kits for IMPD and other local police. This effort was started by The Father's House, a local church, and IPF partnered with the Fraternal Order of Police Lodge #86 to continue to efforts for officers throughout Marion County. To date, we've provided over 1,700 kits to officers, which provides them with the training and tools necessary to provide emergency medical aid for other officers or community members.

07R: There has been quite a bit of controversy over the past couple of years regarding the police and race relations in particular. Without getting too political, how do we reach that fine balance between achieving both public safety and fairness?

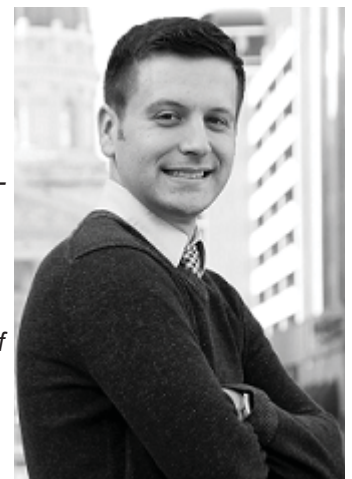
We must rebuild the trust between police officers and the community that has deteriorated over the last several decades. A bilateral lack of understanding and trust can lead to some of the incidents we've seen make national headlines recently. I fully believe that the third part of our mission to build more positive police-community relationships will be part of the long term, sustainable solution to address these issues. With a better understanding of each's roles and responsibilities, as well as a unified commitment to work together instead of against each other, the balance between the need for public safety and fairness to individuals can be achieved. The burden of addressing crime and public safety should not lie solely on the shoulders of our community's police officers; we must all unite and stand together to address these issues.

07R: What is your vision for the IPF say two or three years down the road?

I see IPF playing a vital role in supporting and advocating for public safety here in Central Indiana. Before IPF's establishment, the individual and business communities did not know how to best engage or contribute to public safety issues our city faces. IPF gives an avenue for individuals and business leaders to show their support of the brave work our local police officers do each day. More importantly, we provide an avenue for them to be part of the solution.
