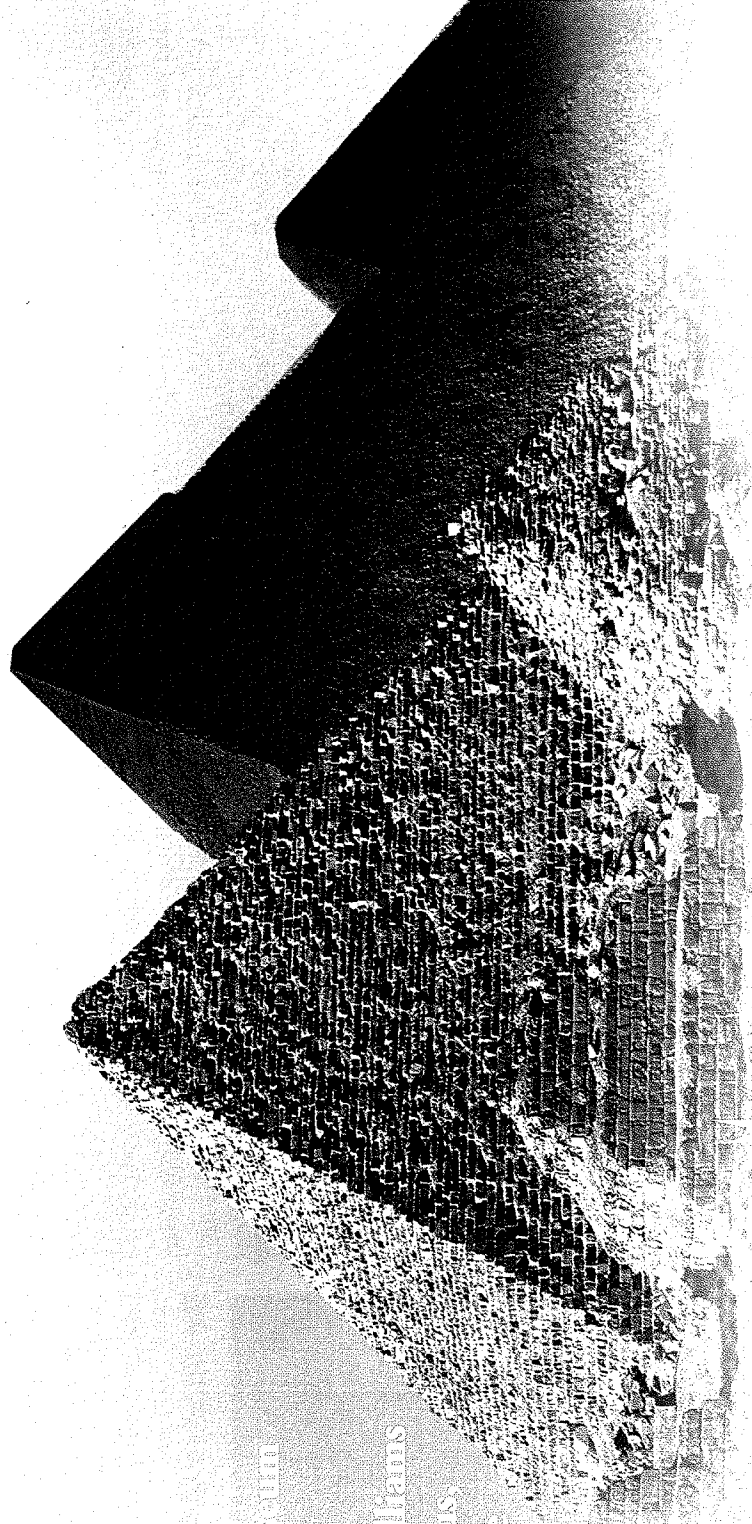

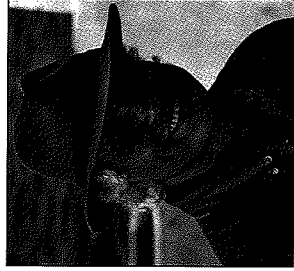

This exceptional 12-day journey will take you and your family deep into Egyptian culture, old and new. You will tour the most important sites, including the Great Pyramids at Giza, the Sphinx, Abu Simbel, and the temples at Luxor and Karnak. Through The Children's Museum's partnership with Dr. Zahi Hawass, Secretary General of the Supreme Council of Egyptian Antiquities, we will have special opportunities to see sites not generally open to the public, and to participate in an excavation. We will sail in grand style on the Nile River and enter historic tombs in the Valley of the Kings and Valley of the Queens. Enjoy shopping in Cairo's famous Khan el Khalili outdoor market and the hospitality of Egyptian children and their families.

You and your children and/or grandchildren (ages 8 and over) will experience a once-in-a-lifetime adventure through ancient Egypt and the land of wonder that is today's Egypt! To join us and create a treasured family memory, please send your registration materials as soon as possible.

Tour Leader: Fadel Gad



Fadel Gad, noted Egyptologist and President and Founder of Joy Travel International, has been leading educational tours of Egypt and other countries for more than 20 years.

Mr. Gad most recently served as Executive Producer for public television specials on Egyptian archaeology. Originally from

Memphis, the first capital of Egypt, Fadel Gad received his Masters in Archaeology, Ancient Egyptology, and Islamic Art at Cairo University. He served as an archaeologist of Antiquities for Egypt. His field experience includes excavations in Fostat, Saqqara, Cellia, and the Monastery of Abo Henes. His comprehensive knowledge of ancient Egypt has enabled him to fill lecture halls. Mr. Gad frequently lectures on Egyptian mythology and the ancient Egyptian concept of gods and goddesses.

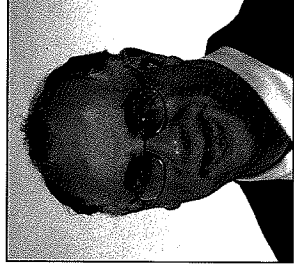
Enrichment Lecturer: Dr. Zahi Hawass



Dr. Zahi Hawass is Egypt's Secretary General of the Supreme Council of Antiquities and director for the Giza Pyramids. Born in Egypt, Dr. Hawass studied archaeology in Egypt and the United States, and earned his Ph.D. in Egyptology from the University of Pennsylvania. A

consultant for documentaries, films, and magazine stories, he has written extensively on Middle Eastern and Egyptian archaeology. He is the author of several books, including *Silent Images: Women in Pharaonic Egypt*, *The Secrets of the Sphinx*, and *The Valley of the Golden Mummies*. In 2000, Dr. Hawass received the Distinguished Scholar Award from the Association of Egyptian American Scholars and was one of 30 international figures to receive the Golden Plate Award from the American Academy of Achievement. He is also a National Geographic Explorer-in-Residence Lecturer.

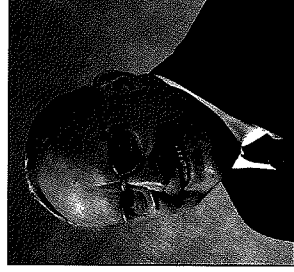
Tour Hosts: Dr. Jeffrey Patchen



Dr. Jeffrey Patchen is President and CEO of The Children's Museum of Indianapolis, where he directs the museum's vision and long-range strategic efforts. He works closely with the museum's executive team and Board of Trustees to identify, secure funding for, and produce world-class family learning

experiences that have the power to transform the lives of children and families. Dr. Patchen also leads the museum's recent work for Egypt's First Lady Suzanne Mubarak and Dr. Zahi Hawass as they plan and develop new exhibits for the Suzanne Mubarak Children's Museum in Cairo. Other museum initiatives are also underway in Dubai, Amman, Guangzhou, and Amsterdam.

Raymond Williams is the LaFollette Distinguished Professor in the Humanities Emeritus at Wabash College, where he served as a faculty member from 1965, and as Chair of the Philosophy and Religion Department from 1984 to 1996. He then founded and served as Director of the

Wabash Center for Teaching and Learning in Theology and Religion from 1996 to 2002, before retiring in 2002. He was called out of retirement to serve as Dean of the College in 2005-2006. Professor Williams has participated in The Children's Museum's Egypt trip on two previous occasions, and looks forward to welcoming Wabash alumni and friends who register to participate in the 2010 trip.

Tour Itinerary

MARCH 26: DAY 1—USA

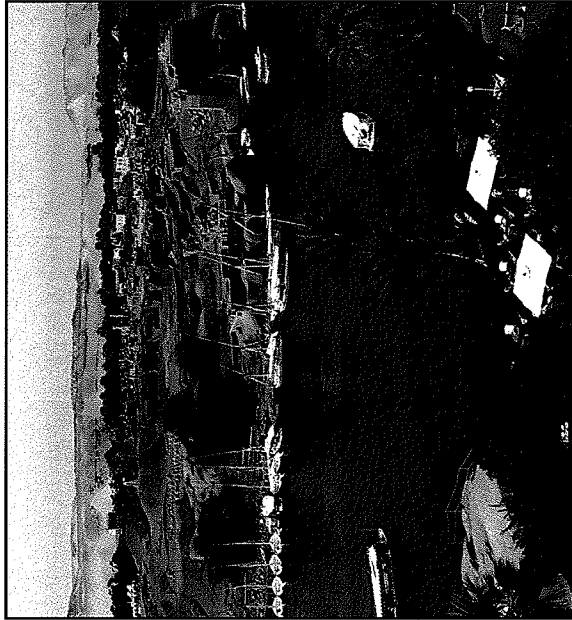
Depart from USA (JFK). Each tour day includes one or more meals. (B=breakfast, L=lunch, D=dinner)

MARCH 27: DAY 2—CAIRO

You will arrive in Cairo in the late afternoon. Settle into your hotel room with its magnificent view overlooking the Great Pyramid, then join the group for a celebratory dinner welcoming you to Egypt, the land of mystery!

MARCH 28: DAY 3—CAIRO, ASWAN

We will take a morning flight to Aswan and visit the Nubian Museum. After lunch, we'll visit the Temple of Isis on Philae Island and explore the ancient granite quarries where workmen once carved and left the Unfinished Obelisks. Evening dinner will be spent with Nubian families followed by a Nubian folkloric show.

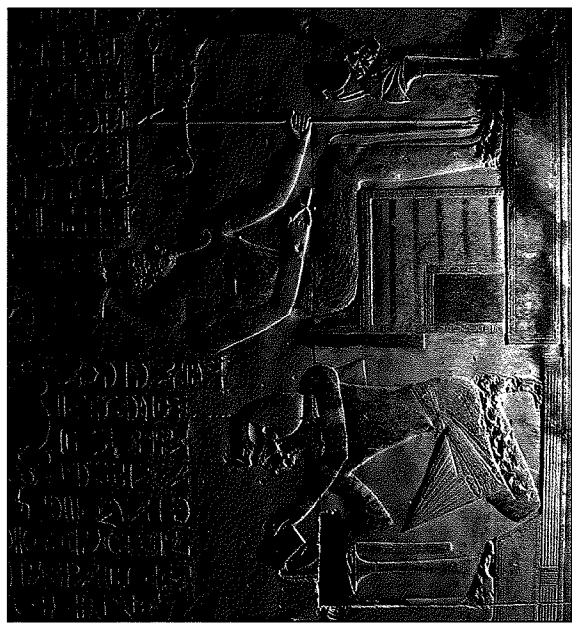


MARCH 29: DAY 4—ASWAN

Our day begins with a morning flight to Abu Simbel in the land of Nubia where we will visit the colossal Temple of Ramses II, which is cut into a mountain. Explore this site along with the smaller temple Ramses dedicated to his wife, Nefertari. After our return flight to Aswan, we will check-in to the Nile Cruise on our special yacht. We will sail in the afternoon by *felucca* (sail boat) to Elephantine Island and the Temple of the creator god, Khnum.

MARCH 30: DAY 5—ASWAN, KOMOMBO, EDFU

Our journey continues with a morning sail to Kom Ombo where we will visit the Temple of Kom Ombo, built for the gods Sobek and Horus. After sailing on to Edfu, horse buggies will take us through the ancient city of Edfu to the Temple of Horus and his consort Hathor. This temple is dedicated to the reunion of the gods and goddesses. Enjoy the evening on deck under a spectacular night sky as we sail past the Esna Locks.

MARCH 31: DAY 6—LUXOR

After a relaxing morning on the sundeck, we will reach Luxor in the afternoon to explore the elaborate complex of ancient architecture at the Temples of Karnak and the Temple of Luxor. In the evening, enjoy an open bar onboard as the sun sets beyond the Sahara.

APRIL 1: DAY 7—LUXOR

We will visit the West Bank and explore the Valley of the Kings and the Valley of the Queens, where the ancient pharaohs, including Tutankhamen and Ramses II and their wives, were buried along with their treasures. Lunch will be at the historic courtyard of the venerable Sheikh Ali Restaurant, the watering hole for the most renowned Egyptologists, including Howard Carter, discoverer of the Tomb of Tutankhamun. Following lunch, we will visit the great mortuary temples of Hatshepsut, Ramses II, and Ramses III, as well as the ancient village of Dier el Medina, with its extraordinary tombs of the workers who built the temples. In the evening we will fly to Cairo.

APRIL 2: DAY 8—CAIRO

On the eighth day we will explore the monuments on the Giza Plateau and visit the Great Pyramid, the only surviving intact monument of the Seven Wonders of the Ancient World. Our tour includes a visit to the interior of the King and Queen's Chamber, made possible through special permission granted by the Egyptian Antiquities Department. At sunset, we will take a camel ride past all the monuments on the Giza Plateau.

APRIL 3: DAY 9—CAIRO

In the morning we will drive to Sakkara, the necropolis of Memphis, Egypt's ancient capital, and view the Bent Pyramid and the Step Pyramid—the oldest stone building in history—built 5,000 years ago by the genius architect Imhotep. We will spend the day working on the French Excavation under the supervision of Dr. Alain Zivie, and we'll enjoy a special four-wheel drive adventure in the Egyptian Sahara.

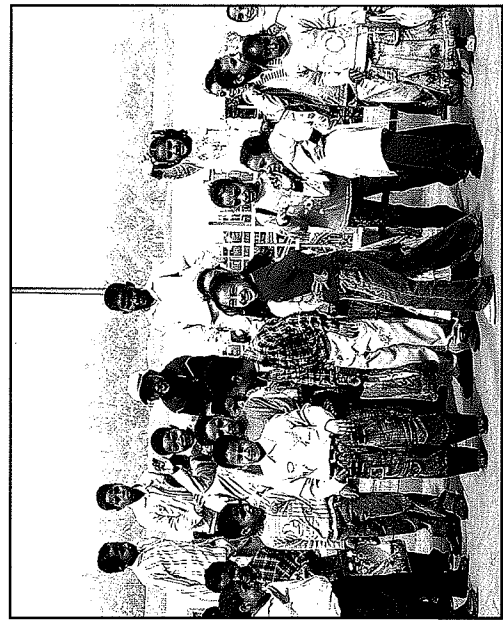
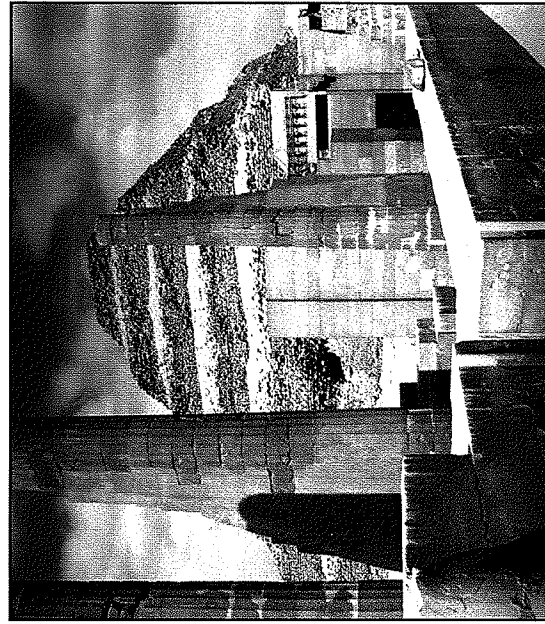

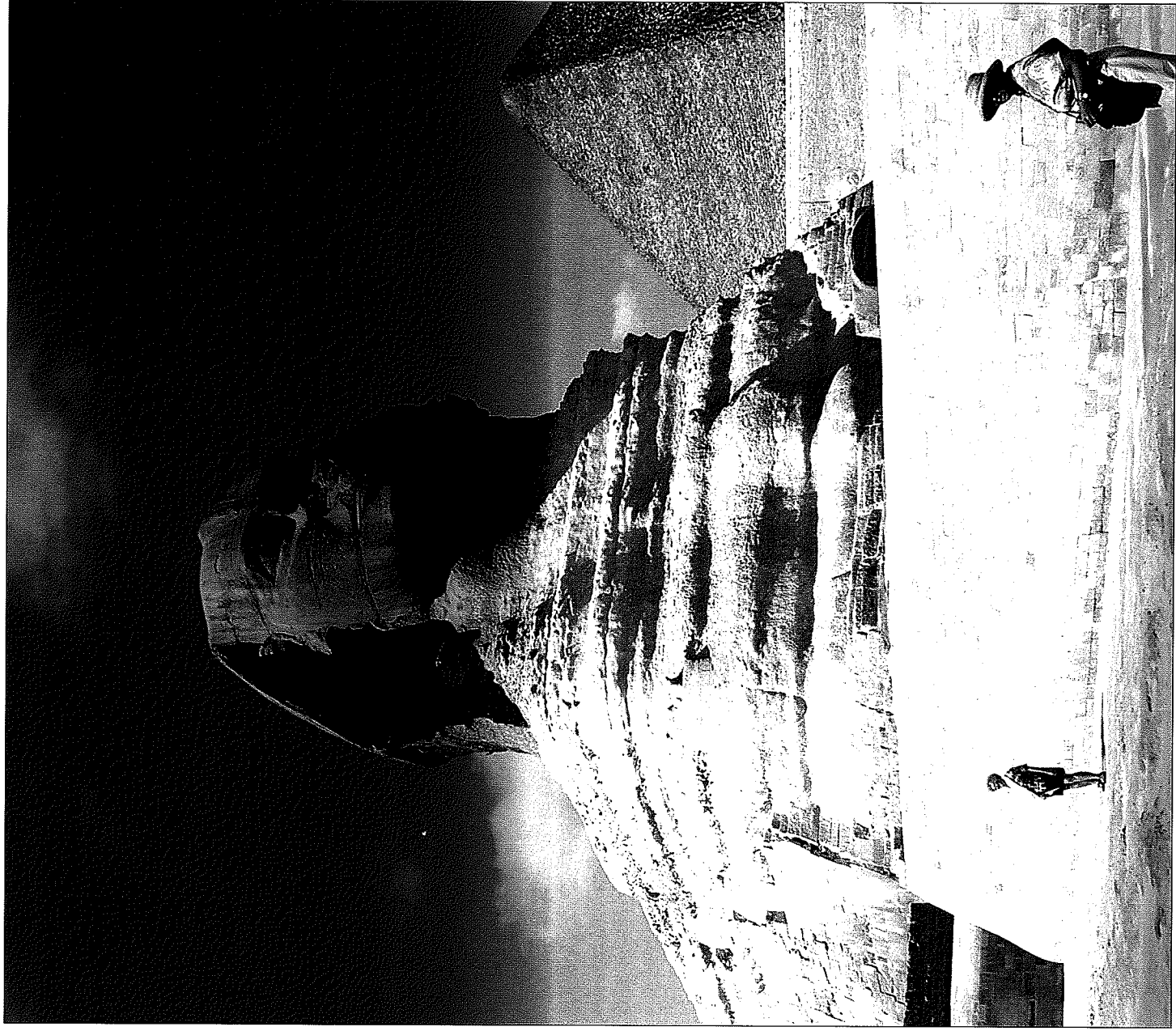
APRIL 5: DAY 11—CAIRO

On our final day we will spend the morning viewing the Egyptian Museum's famous collection of artifacts from the Tomb of King Tutankhamun as well as the treasures from the Old Kingdom, Middle Kingdom, and New Kingdom. We'll enjoy an authentic Egyptian lunch and music in the Old City, and stroll up the 16th-century street of the Tentmakers, and through the 10th-century Fatimid City with its medieval houses, inns, and marketplaces. You will experience Al-Azhar, the oldest continuously functioning university in the world, and spend the evening shopping or enjoying an elaborately served tea in the famous Cairo Suq, Khan el-Khalili's age-old outdoor market.

APRIL 6: DAY 12—CAIRO, USA

Early morning flight to USA.



Tour Cost

- \$5,035 per adult (age 18 and over) in double room.
- Additional \$850 for optional single-room supplement.
- Children ages 8 to 11 who accompany and room with their parents/grandparents travel for \$3,610 per person. Four people per room maximum.
- Families with children age 12 to 17 who accompany their parents/grandparents and who share a single room will travel for \$4,955 per family member. Four people per room maximum.
- Upon registration, each family will be asked to make a \$500 tax-deductible donation to either The Children's Museum of Indianapolis or Wabash College. Families are also welcome to divide their contribution between the two institutions.

Reservation and Payment

A deposit of \$500 is due to Joy Travel International ("Tour Operator") at the time of booking. Final payment will be due 60 days prior the departure date. On bookings made within 60 days of departure date, full and final payment will be due immediately upon booking. No booking will be considered final until full payment is received.

Insurance

We recommend that all participants obtain travel insurance. No refund will be made for transfers, city tours, or any other services (including meals, accommodations, or transportation voluntarily not used or taken).
