Theta Delta Chi Leads Relay For Life Fundraising, Ceremonies

Theta Delta Chi led Wabash in the Relay for Life last weekend by raising the highest amount of money on campus with \$2,328. Also, Jacob Surface '11, Philanthropy Chair, served as emcee for the event.

Jim Amidon, the College's Director of Public Affairs, helped organize the event and was very enthusiastic about the results. "I don't have an exact figure, but we did raise over \$75,000, and there is about \$8,000 more coming to us," he said. "It's more than we have ever raised before. It was close to our goal of \$85,000, but by the end of the fiscal year in August we should have that amount raised."

Nine bids were distributed from our Charge that weekend, and three prospectives chose immediately to accept.

Dressed to impress in our new rush polos and prepared to rush high school seniors with the true essence of college life at Wabash, our brotherhood plunged into Honor Scholar Weekend with tired bodies, but maintained bright, positive attitudes, and our hard work paid off. Starting with the previous Sunday, we Theta Delts cleaned, organized, and refurbished the house all week until Honor Scholar weekend began with the arrival of the first prospective. With the aid of the families of brothers such as Jake Moore '11 and Kyle O'Keefe' 08, and Sarah Castor (the girlfriend of Bryan Arnold '09), we built a new sign for the front yard,

TDX Saves Lives (102 to Be Exact)

Once again, brother Bryan Arnold '09 and the men of Theta Delta Chi stepped in to assist the Indiana Blood Center in its bi-annual blood drive on the campus of Wabash College. Theta Delt has hosted the event for the past few years in the Knowling Field House and Arnold has served as the college coordinator and promoter of the drive, helping recruit *victims*, or **donors** rather, to come out and give their time and blood to a good cause.



Indiana Blood Center is a vital link in Indiana's health care infrastructure, supplying more than 550 units of blood to more than 60 Indiana hospitals every day. The nonprofit community service organization was founded in 1952 to provide a continuous, safe and adequate supply of blood products and testing services first to the people in our own communities, then wherever our blood products and testing services are needed.

More than forty volunteers came out for the drive with thirty-four accepted as donors. Said IBC field representative Gina Kornafel, "We hit our mark with thirty four donors, with each donor representing about three opportunities to save someone in need of blood. You guys could have potentially saved over one-hundred lives by helping us organize this one event. I just want to thank you for being such a big help."
