# Oct. 25-28: Moot Court

Thirty Wabash students participated in the 21st Annual Wabash College Moot Court Competition. Andrew Dettmer '15 was named Top Advocate. The judges panel selected Dettmer over finalists Jacob Burnett '15, Daniel Thompson '16,



and Matthew Binder '16. Rick Pitts '83 wrote this year's case involving free speech and social media.

This year the panel was led by Judge Jane Magnus-Stinson, the United States District Court for Indiana's Southern District. She was joined by Andrew R. Klein, dean of the IU Robert H. McKinney Law School at Indianapolis, and James Joven '88, a Marion County Superior Court judge. Each year a member of the Wabash faculty or administration serves as a judge, who was Dean of the College Scott Feller.

Moot Court was streamed live again this year. As in previous years, students and faculty from Lawrence North Nigh School, Indianapolis, joined a good student turnout in the audience.
