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Just a reminder that June 30 is fast approaching. Please check to be sure to you are in the game. Wabash needs all possible alumni to reach, once again, the lofty 40% giving. We are 12 years running with 40%. This places us in a very elite group and helps the College in many ways. Foundations and corporations are more likely to give support if alumni show strong support. Even prospective parents are asking about it!



There were 186 Diplomas awarded this year, with many awards to further education. And, Wabash has 288 paid deposits as of June 30. This could be the largest class in some time. President Feller will have his hands full as Dean of the College, McDorman, is going on sabbatical, and Dean of Students Greg Redding is returning to teaching. Plus, Jay Allen is

stepping down after ten years as Chair of the Board of Trustees. These are men who have held positions thru Covid and are now seeking change.

Notes.....

Sparks Center is now coming down! This is a 2-year project which will be magnificent when complete. (They are saving the beautiful cypress ceiling supports for future use somewhere.) I was unaware that there is a tunnel under the campus which supports heating, cooling and electrical. That will be replaced and updated. I have no idea where it is!

Wabash smoked the Dannie's twice in basketball last season, with one of the reasons being that 15 of our 17 players came from Indiana....(although nobody hailed from Alamo!). Coach Brumett is an outstanding coach who has consistently had good teams who play well together."

Wrestling produced two inductions into the Div III Wrestling Hall of Fame: former coach Brian Anderson and Riley Lefever (who was basically undefeated!) Wabash sent 6 guys to the Nationals this year.

Wabash won both the 2025 NCAC Indoor and Outdoor Track and Field Championships. Senior Brayden Curnutt (Wabash) earned the Conference Men's Distance/Mid-distance Runner of the Year Award. Also, Will Neubauer of Wabash, earned All American honors by finishing 7th at the 2025, NCAA, Division III, Outdoor Track and Field Championships!" Some Little Giants!

Bawibawi Thang gained All Midwest Volleyball League team honors. He led the League in total kills with 374.

Jake Pippen scored many goals on the Lacrosse team. I need to accompany Pete & Janie to a game next season so they can explain it to me!

Sean Bledsoe finished as runner up in the NCAC Golf Championship played at Otter Creek Course in Columbus, IN. Wabash finished 5th of 8 teams which is an improvement. Senior Lewis Dellinger scored a hole-in-one on the par 3 13th hole, followed by an eagle on 14. (Did you know what an Albatross was before The Open? – I did not!!!)

<u>John Birdzell</u> has amended my earlier baseball report. "Baseball set a school record for victories (27), were runners up to Denison in conference play, but lost to Witt and Wooster in the tournament."

Paul Olexia PhD '61 04/01/2025

Paul D. Olexia was born July 31, 1939, in McKeesport, Pa, the son of Paul and Gladys Olexia. He is preceded in death by his parents, his brother, Gary Olexia and his daughter, Julie. Surviving are his wife Sally Olexia and their son Michael and his wife Deanna. Also surviving is Deborah (Olexia) Stilley, his daughter from a previous marriage and her family. Paul grew up in western Pennsylvania and graduated from Clairton (Pa) High School. He received his B.A. degree from Wabash College where he majored in zoology and played varsity football. He received his M.A. degree from the St. University of New York at Buffalo and went on to get his Ph.D. from the University of Tennessee in Botany (mycology), working under Dr. Ronald Petersen with whom he maintained a life-long friendship. Upon completion of doctorate, he served a one-year appointment as a sabbatical replacement at Colgate University. Subsequently, he took a teaching position at Kalamazoo College in 1968 where he taught until retirement in 2002. His primary courses were Botany, Evolution and Environmental Science along with occasional courses in Freshwater Ecology, Plant Ecology, Mycology, and Plant and Animal Diversity. He served as Chair of the Biology Dept. and subsequently as Chair of the Division of Natural Sciences and Mathematics. During his time at K College, he collaborated with researchers at Oak Ridge National Laboratories, Argonne National labs, and the University of Rhode Island. His main area of research interest was mycorrhizal fungi which grow mutualistically with the roots of most plant species. While at Kalamazoo College he collaborated with his good friend Ahmed Hussen, initiating an interdisciplinary Concentration in Environmental Studies. He was an initial faculty leader for the Land/Sea Program. Additionally, he enjoyed assisting with announcing football games as well as an official scorer for basketball games at Kalamazoo College for a number of years. Through his long-standing interest in sports, he remained active in pickup basketball, recreational bicycling, and especially playing handball until his early 60's. After his retirement, he was active with both the Southwest Michigan Land Conservancy and the Kalamazoo Area Wild Ones. He served as President and board member of both organizations. An area of special interest to Paul was the Wild Ones Community Projects Committee which implemented and managed native plant projects at a number of locations throughout the city. His conservation efforts, resulted in a diverse, notable collection of native plants, mostly spring ephemerals at his home in Kalamazoo. Throughout his life he remained interested in fungi, plants, nature, conservation, and environmental protection..

Arrangements for a celebration of his life are ongoing and will be made public at a later date. In lieu of flowers, memorial contributions in his memory may be made to any of the following organizations: Kalamazoo Area Wild Ones,

Dear JB and Barb,

This is obviously not a Christmas letter, but rather an addendum to our 2025 Christmas communication.

Our South America and Antarctica cruise over Christmas turned into a disaster. On the third day out of Buenos Aires, Pat got up during the night to use the rest room in our stateroom, and fell and broke her hip. We were disembarked at Punta del Este, Uruguay; Pat had emergency surgery at the hospital in Punta del Este, and after a week of rest and rehabilitation, we flew back to Denver, assisted by an escort nurse provided by our travel insurer.

After five days in the emergency room at University of Colorado hospital, she was transferred to a rehabilitation center for therapy. After three weeks there, I tried to bring her home, but she was still unable to stand or walk on her own (the hip surgery was apparently successful, but her preexisting condition of polyneuropathy in her legs was greatly aggravated by her injury), so we had to move her to an assisted living facility.

She developed a urinary tract infection, and after emergency hospitalization, we moved her to skilled nursing care, but her condition continued to deteriorate, and we moved her to another assisted living facility where she received hospice care. Unable to stand, walk or use the bathroom facilities on her own, she continued to decline, and finally she passed on May 8.

I thought you would want to know.

I hope you are doing well; I am bearing up as best I can. I have put our house up for sale, and expect to be moving somewhere back east when it sells. Keep in touch.
