The Day of Giving in April: A group of Wabash leaders offered \$625,000 to challenge alumni and friends to make 5,000 gifts. In the spirit of celebration, another group of leaders stepped up in the evening to offer an additional \$192,000 to motivate the Wabash Nation to reach 2,025 more gifts. By final count, 3,460 individual donors gave 8,335 gifts and \$1,825,622 in support of Wabash students.

Classmate News


Hi Duane,

Obituary of **Lahi Armand Luhahi**: It is with profound sadness that we share the passing of our beloved Dr. Professor Emeritus Lahi Armand Luhahi, born June 16, 1940, in Djundu, Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) who passed away peacefully after a life richly lived in service and kindness on Monday, May 12, 2025 at home surrounded by loved ones.

Papa Armand, as he was affectionately known, was a shining light in the lives of all who had the privilege of knowing him. His journey on this earth was one marked by love, compassion, and unwavering faith in God. His passing has left a big void in the hearts of his family, friends, and many more whose lives were touched by him.

Dr. Luhahi is survived by his loving wife, Yema (née Museu), whom he married on June 16, 1972, and his three children: Shutshe, Ndjeka and Akaki (Kividi). Dr. Luhahi is cherished by his grandchildren: Ayel, Aton, Asha, Joseph, and Layla. He is also survived by his sister, Mama Uhandju, and his younger brother, Ndjeka Paul. He is preceded in death by three siblings. He also leaves behind nieces and nephews who adored him dearly and a host of cousins who shared in his joyful spirit.

After his graduation from High School, Dr. Luhahi left his country, DRC-Congo and embarked on a lifelong journey in the United States of America to focus on his education. He obtained his B.S. of Mathematics from Wabash College in Indiana in 1967. In 1969, he obtained his M.S. in Mathematics from Ohio University. He returned to his native country and obtained his PhD in Mathematics from the University of Kinshasa in 1975. After holding various positions within the University of Kinshasa such as: Director of the Mathematics Department, Vice Dean and Dean of the Faculty of Sciences, Academic Advisor for the University of Kinshasa, and Director of the Mathematics department. He was called by his country to serve, three times, by three different Ministers of education to serve as an Academic Advisor to each of the Minister of Education. Within his time in Academia, he published many books and publications.

In 1993, Dr Luhahi found his purpose in missionary work. He was recruited by the United Methodist Church of America (UMCA) to assemble a team of educators to start, from the ground up, the University of Meru in Kenya. He became Vice Chancellor of the University until his retirement. His dedication to his faith and his desire to bring education to those in need epitomized his joyful and generous nature. Once retired from missionary work, Dr. Luhahi returned to Academia as a board member at Africa University to pave the way for the next generation of young African men and women leaders.

Those who knew Papa Armand will remember him for his infectious smile and overwhelming selflessness, his deep-rooted faith in God, and his unwavering commitment to spreading love and kindness to everyone he encountered. He had a rare gift for making others smile and laugh, leaving a lasting impact on all who crossed his path.
