**IN *The Bachelor* 50 YEARS AGO** – Nine new faculty members came to teach at the Academic Halls of Crawfordsville, most noticeably Tobey Herzog (English) and Melissa Butler (Political Science). Both would be mainstays on the faculty for more than 30 years.

College attrition declined: Enrollment stayed nearly the same (859 students) in the Fall of 1976 compared to 857 in the Fall of 1975. The Student Senate was forced to slash club budget requests by as much as 20 percent, according to Bachelor writer BILL SIKES. News editor MICHAEL MURPHY reported that the Intra Fraternity Council (IFC) was planning for an All-Greek semi-formal dance in February as the “official” Pan-Hel event for the college. And ANDY ROBERTSON, who reported for the paper, also made news by appearing dressed as Benjamin Franklin in one of Professor Peter Frederick’s classes.

Also, the college and the IFC were having difficulties in reaching lease agreements. The football team was 2-0 in the early going, defeating Washington Univ. 30-8 and then upending Hope College 22-19. (Coincidentally, Washington comes to play Wabash this October 24). The films “Murder by Death” and “Harry and Walter Go to New York” were playing at the Strand. “Black Faculty Missing” was the headline of an opinion column in the paper.

IN THE HEADLINES: Mao Zedong died in September, the Viking 2 unmanned spacecraft landed at Utopia Planitia on the surface of Mars, and President Gerald Ford and challenger (and former governor) Jimmy Carter held their first presidential debate on Sept. 23. If you were an audiophile, you might have been first in line to purchase Stevie Wonder’s highly anticipated double album “Song in the Key of Life” that late September.

Some of the top songs that month were “You Should Be Dancing” by the Bee Gees and “Play That Funky Music” by Wild Cherry. “Happy Days” and “Laverne and Shirley” were atop the television ratings, but a new show named “Charlie’s Angels” was also wildly popular, both nationally and in fraternities and dormitories around campus.
