Jay Field Moore, 85, of Rock Hill, passed away Tuesday, January 7, 2025, surrounded by his family. Born Friday, January 20, 1939, in Gary, Indiana, he was the second of five children to the late Prentice Moore and Margureite Mason Moore. He graduated from Wabash College where he studied Speech and English Literature, was in the Phi Delta Theta fraternity and enjoyed playing on the football and baseball teams. He also served his country in the United States Army Reserves. His gregarious personality was well suited to his long career in sales as a regional sales development manager for Cryovac. Jay was very social, humorous, fun loving and often the life of the party. Jay's commitment to the love of Christ flowed through his heart in many ways. He was a volunteer with hospice for many years and would come home often talking about how special it was to be of assistance to those about to transition. He was also a co-founder of the not for profit Mayday in Clover, SC where he established fund raisers for homeless and underprivileged children in need in the Clover School district. He took a tremendous amount of pride in being of service to others. He was a life long avid golfer, he loved the sport so much that his after retirement, his fun job was selling high end golf tours in Great Britain and Spain for SGH Golf. Jay was also a lover of music. He started playing piano by ear at age 5 and hardly a day went by throughout his entire life that he didn't play. He played piano beautifully for the enjoyment of self, family and entertainment of others. He and Nancy loved to travel and spent much of their retirement years traversing the globe. It brought Jay tremendous pleasure to create loving fond memories with friends and family. Jay's larger than life personality and big love, just like his music, will forever resonate in the hearts of those who were fortunate enough to soak it up.

Jay is survived by his loving wife of 61 years, Nancy Ellen Smith Moore; son, John Moore (Anne Gessner); daughter, Julie Moore Lindsey; brothers, Dick, Bill and Tim (Barb) Moore; sister Jeanine (Ken) Hansen; granddaughter, Micah Lindsey and grandsons, Mason Lindsey, Renner and Russell Moore. Austin Brooks - written by Jim Amidon

I'm saddened to share the news that Dr. Austin Brooks '61 passed away Sunday morning after a lengthy battle with cancer. Aus taught biology at Wabash from 1966 until his retirement in 2004. His students referred to him as a "gentle giant; a careful, patient teacher with high expectations."

When Aus arrived at Wabash in 1957 as a pledge in the Delt house, he was planning to study history and politics. An upperclassman in the house – Tom Cole '58 – steered him to biology. Both Wabash men would go on to earn Ph.D.s and return to their alma mater as biology professors.

Decades later, when Dr. Cole was in the final stages of pancreatic cancer, Dr. Brooks picked up his Cole's research – and with the help of a team of former "T. Coli" students and colleagues – completed and published the research.

Aus loved the water and with his colleague, Bill Doemel (whom he recruited to Wabash), led a series of six-week summer aquatic biology field trips featuring a 34-foot Avion trailer and lots of canoes. Those legendary trips included study of the Florida Keys, Yellowstone, the Boundary Waters of Wisconsin, and a tour of the East Coast.

Aus earned the Fredrick J. Urbaska Civic Service Award from the National Association of Wabash Men for his unwavering commitment to the Montgomery County community – as a board member, president, and CASA for the Montgomery County Youth Service Bureau; active leader of the Friends of Sugar Creek; and as an iconic Deacon in Wabash Avenue Presbyterian Church.


<u>Jan Wood</u> heard from Jack Gakstatter that his wife, Susie, died on March 3. It is sad to hear from old friends with such sad news.

Austin Brooks Obituary

Austin Edward Brooks, Jr. died on May 11, 2025, at home surrounded by his family. He was born on August 10, 1938, in Fort Wayne, IN to Austin Edward Brooks, Sr., and Gertrude (Wilson) Brooks. He graduated from Northside High School in 1957. When he arrived on the Wabash campus in the fall of 1957, he had no idea he would return to Wabash to spend his entire academic career and Crawfordsville would become his home. After graduating

from Wabash in 1961, he attended graduate school to study Biology at IU – Bloomington, earning a PhD in 1965.

He married Eva Lucille (Lucy) Clark in 1963. After IU he accepted a post-doctoral fellowship to study at Brown University in Providence, RI, where their first child, Timothy Austin, was born. In the fall of 1966 they returned to Crawfordsville, where Austin taught Biology at Wabash for 38 years before retiring in 2004. During that time, their second child, Laura Beth, was born.

While at Wabash, Austin pioneered many innovative teaching techniques, including organizing with colleague and dear friend Bill Doemel the Wabash Aquatic Biology Program. For four summers, this program provided 15 students the opportunity to spend 6 weeks in a different wilderness setting including Yellowstone, the Boundary Waters and Northern Wisconsin, the Florida Keys, and the Northeast Coast. He also developed a patented technique which allowed a blind student to feel microscopic images. Additionally, he eagerly supported the use of technology and computers as teaching tools and pursued research worldwide with sabbaticals and research trips to such diverse locations as Hamburg, Germany, Bangkok, Thailand, Johns Hopkins University and the Pacific Northwest.

After retirement Austin became involved in several community organizations including the Friends of Sugar Creek, the Youth Service Bureau, the Park Board, and served as both an elder and deacon for his church, the Wabash Avenue Presbyterian Church. In retirement he was able to pursue his many hobbies which included fly fishing with his buddy, David Hadley, wood carving, especially song birds, turning wooden bowls, travel and biking.

He is survived by his wife (Lucy) of 61 years, his two children Tim (Kathy) and Laura (Brian), four grandchildren Lizzie (Josh), Delaney, Jenna, and Nathan and two great-grandchildren, Jazmyn and Dekan. He was preceded in death by his parents, a brother, sister and great-granddaughter.

A celebration of his life will be held at a later time. Donations in his memory can be made to Wabash College, The Friends of Sugar Creek or the Youth Service Bureau.

"Dear Old Wabash, thy loyal sons shall ever love thee..." Aus most certainly did!
