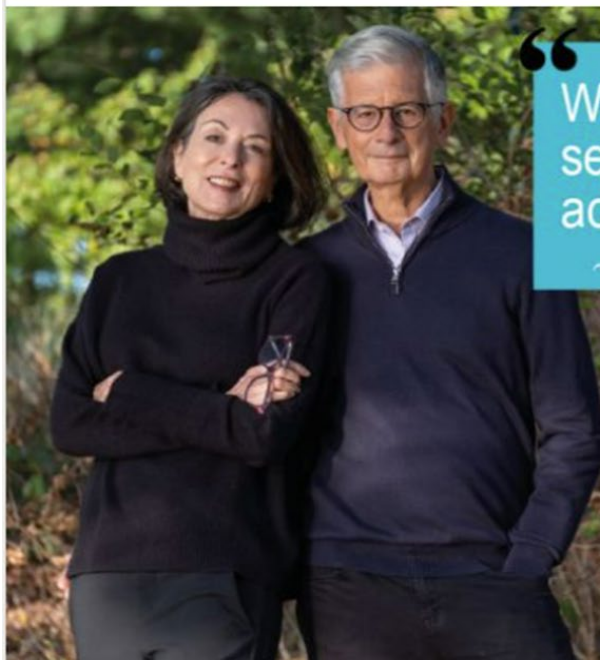

John B. Goodrich, age 76, of rural Portland passed away Tuesday morning July 12, 2022 at his residence. John was born in Winchester on November 6, 1945 the son of Perce Gordon and Francis Ann (Hawkins) Goodrich.

He was married on March 24, 1972 to Sarona Mathews who survives. He was owner and operator of J&P Custom Plating in Portland and had been a teacher at Bloomfield Elementary School. He was a 1963 Portland High School graduate and a 1968 Wabash College graduate. He was the current President of Portland Rotary, is a Paul Harris Fellow and managed the Rotary Tree Project. He was a member of First Presbyterian Church, member of Presbyterian Foundation and had taught Sunday school to Jr. and Sr. classes. He served on the Jay County School Board, Board of Directors of John Jay Center, President of Goodrich Family Foundation and served on Jay Community Center Board of Directors. He was awarded Citizen of the Year from Jay County Chamber of Commerce and was founder of Goodrich Brewery. He received an award from Wabash College for being an Alumni Admissions Fellow helping many young men to attend Wabash College where he was a member of Beta Theta Pi Fraternity. John

was an avid Spiderman Enthusiast, enjoyed fishing, living in the woods, trees, working and his family.

## **Wabash Raises \$3.9 Million in Record-Setting Fiscal Year**

Capping a year packed with giant achievements, alumni, parents, faculty, staff, students, and friends propelled Wabash College to the highest annual fundraising total in the institution's 190-year history. More than \$3.9 million was donated in the 2021-22 fiscal year to the College's Annual Fund, surpassing the record that was set last year by \$300,998.

### **NABC Academic Awards**

The National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) announced a pair of academic awards on Tuesday and five North Coast Athletic Conference (NCAC) men's basketball programs were tabbed with the Team Academic Award, while 24 conference student-athletes earned NABC Honors Court recognition. The Academic Team Award recognizes outstanding academic achievement by a team with a cumulative grade-point average of 3.0 or better for the 2021-22 season. Denison, DePauw, Kenyon, Ohio Wesleyan and **Wabash** were among the 300+ programs listed.

The NABC Honors Court recognizes men's collegiate basketball student-athletes who excelled in academics during the past season. In order to be named to the Honors Court, a student-athlete has to be academically a junior or senior and a varsity player, achieve a cumulative grade point average of 3.2 or higher, must have matriculated at least one year at the current institution and be a member of an NCAA Division I, II, III institution with an NABC member coach.

Me and the Bitterroot. The river was formerly called the Clark River, named after the Lewis and Clark expedition which came through here in 1805.

Beautiful shot of Mike Dybel and castle at Neuschwanstein. It was one of the checkpoints when we hung wing tanks on the A-10 once a quarter. Usually we did a Swiss border check—without the inertial nav system—had to read the map. The joke (told by faster jets) was—you ran out of crew rest. I flew 5 years in Europe, plus two non-flying tours. Visited a lot of history there, including Neuschwanstein. The Germans had a low-fly watcher device called Flycatcher—really a modified Gephard anti-aircraft gun—and they “caught” me at 85 feet in a 100 foot area. Hey, I was in a bank in the photo they sent.
