Hi Classmates! Greg, Herm and I actually have quite a bit of news (lots of it good) to share with you as we turn the calendar from February to March and the page from winter to summer. Let's dive right into the details...

\$25 MILLION – That's the amount of the grant Wabash received from the Lilly Endowment in December. The grant's purpose is to collaborate more closely with the greater Crawfordsville community to improve quality of life. The grant will help fund a campus and community engagement center, support an early childcare center, nurture and sustain the nonprofit ecosystem, and work closely with the growing Latino community. The grant enables Wabash to hire a Director of Latino Partnerships and establish a Latino Community Center in addition to supporting the La Alianza student group.

A portion of that money will assist the college with the construction of a new "community center" (sort of a working title). It is a two-year project which will cost about \$80 million. PRESTIGIOUS SCHOLARSHIPS AND FELLOWSHIPS – Wabash's outstanding academic standards continue to bring opportunities for today's students. FIRST BLACK STUDENT CELEBRATED, HONORED – Wabash

commemorated John R. Blackburn (pictured at right), the first Black student to attend the college, with a series of events in early February. After extensive investigation, Associate Professor of English and Black Studies Timothy Lake discovered his identity. Seventeen of Blackburn's descendants gathered on the Wabash campus to celebrate and honor his legacy, and the College presented them with a posthumous honorary degree in tribute to Blackburn.

RIP CHICK CLEMENTS



Our honorary class member Thomas Duane "Chick" Clements died peacefully at Wellbrooke of Crawfordsville on Feb. 15 at the age of 89. A Korean War veteran, "Chick" worked as the Athletic Dept. Equipment manager for Wabash from 1966 to 2003. He was inducted into the Wabash Athletics Hall of Fame in 1993, and a suite in the new Little Giant stadium was dedicated in his name in 2022. Chick was born May 25, 1934, at Crawfordsville, to Ruth and Vernon Clements. He graduated from Crawfordsville High School in 1952. He briefly attended Butler University on an athletic scholarship. He then served in the Korean War.

After returning from the war, he married Janet Payne in June, 1956; his life-long partner of 64 years. He worked as the Athletic Department Equipment Manager for Wabash College from 1966 to 2003. While at Wabash, he was made an Honorary Alumnus, Class of 1977. Chick was a mentor, advocate, friend, and father-figure to generations of Wabash men. He was as devoted to the Wabash community as it was to him. It was his devotion to the spirit and place of all things Wabash that made him "some Little Giant." In 1998 he was inducted into the Wabash College Athletic Hall of Fame. And in 2022, a Little Giants Football Stadium suite was dedicated in his name. There was no memorial service: In lieu of flowers, please donate to your local animal shelter or rescue.
