Fellow members of the Class of '77 – It's been a terrific start of the 2022-2023 academic year at Dear Old Wabash. President Scott Feller “rang in” (with Caleb Mills’ bell, the same one Dr. Thaddeus Seymour used for us on Freshman Sunday back in 1973) a class of 267 incoming freshmen, **the second largest in a decade**. There were also 13 students who re-enrolled after Covid-related difficulties precluded them from attending (many are foreign students who couldn't get into the US).



More than 11,150 donors have shown their support since the campaign kicked off in 2018, and has already raised more than \$233 million and created 91 new endowed funds: scholarships, professorships, and academic department funds. Thank you to all who have taken Giant Steps for Wabash, and there's still time to do more to strengthen Wabash's future before the June 30, 2023 deadline expires on the most successful fundraising campaign in Wabash's 190-year history. The college also received an all-time record of \$3.9 million in contributions to the annual fund, and achieved the 40% mark in percentage of alumni who gave to the college in 2021-2022. It's the ninth-straight year Wabash has reached 40% or more in alumni giving. The college's 83% four-year graduation rate in '21-'22 was better than many colleges of all types (private, public, religious).

Last week US News & World Report came out with its annual college rankings, and our alma mater had more “A” marks than ever before. It ranked Wabash as an **“A+ School for B Students,”** an institution “where spirit and hard work could make all the difference to admissions,” Wabash’s 87% first-year student retention rate ranked inside the top-10 nationally among A+ schools. Additionally, the College was listed among Top Performers on Social Mobility, identifying Wabash as a college that is “more successful than others at advancing social mobility by enrolling and graduating large proportions of disadvantaged students awarded with Pell Grants.” Coming from a pretty economically-disadvantaged background myself, I can relate to the importance of this life-changing Wabash attribute. We've lost two class members since our last letter at/around our reunion time in June and our last class letter. ROB CLARK passed in July, and he'll be missed and mourned by his Kappa Sigma brothers. Rob leaves his wife Barbara (Alig), two children and a grandson. Here are a couple of sentences from his obituary: "He taught his children the love of sports, the importance of a sense of humor, and the priority of family. Making nightly family dinners a priority was a significant part of our family dynamic.

"He fought his battle of oral cancer with such determination, courage and perseverance. He never complained that he was not able to eat or talk as well as he once did. His faith grew during this time and he often asked for prayers and scriptures to be read to him. Cancer often steals a person's joy,

character and zeal, but with Rob nothing could be further from the truth. He still traveled and enjoyed each day to the fullest." Rob worked at Blue Cross and Blue Shield, The Indiana State Department of Health, the Attorney General's Office, and most recently with Indiana University Health in the grants department.

Also, classmate DIRK BERARD penned these words: "Our fellow '77 classmate, my Morris Hall roommate, and longtime dear friend, JOHN H. MORROW, quietly passed away in his sleep on Monday, September 5th. [It is difficult for me to even type those words.] This was unexpected, even though he had been going through some health issues. By God's good grace, he and I had a long, pleasant, and entertaining (as was typical), phone call the evening before. I am very thankful for that. One of the many things we talked about that evening was how very much we enjoyed our years at Wabash. John said he would go back to that time in a heartbeat.

"Obviously, none of us are able to do that. But in a *figurative* and memorial way, I drove to Crawfordsville the following weekend and *for John* "went back to Wabash" and walked through the campus. I sat on a bench in the mall looking at each building in turn, thinking about the classes John and I had taken together in each of the buildings – such as Dr. Swift's calculus class in Baxter Hall, the

time we both spent working for Dr. Willis Johnson on his research project in the basement of Waugh Hall, Dr. Haenisch's quantitative chemistry class in Goodrich Hall, the many meals we ate together in the Sparks Center dining hall, and of course the four years living in Morris Hall.

"John had a very impressive career as a marine biologist, which included assisting on expeditions with Jean-Michelle Cousteau and serving as the CEO of Biospherical Instruments in San Diego.
