From the Minnesota restaurant, where I was among the local alums convened to watch, I texted Doug McKay to see if he was at the game and, sure enough, he was there and texted a picture to let me know what a spectacular Autumn Day it was in Indiana.

And I must add a huge shout out to Charlie Crowley '70 who is the glue for the Minnesota based alums. He is THE unfailing great Son of Wabash. Kudos to his work on getting us together!

At our gathering this year I met Richard Most (Class of 1986), and his wife Julie. They have been in Minnesota for the last 15 years. Richard is Sigma Chi, as am I, and it was amazing how quickly we connected over our overlapping bros.



And it made me ponder about that overlapping thing that happens really, for any 4 year higher ed program. When we reminisce about Wabash, it usually isn't just who we know from our graduating class. We were also at school with the three classes from before our graduation and the three classes after our graduation. We also often know men from other classes too.

Hear me out on this proposition and how I think it can help us find ways to update and re-connect with each other. I will of course, use myself as the example... but I'll leave blanks for folks to fill in.

Here is a kind of schematic to use for my point:

We, the Class of 1981, entered Fall 1977 as Freshman

The Seniors were Class of 1978
The Juniors were Class of 1979
The Sophomores were Class of 1980

And, as we moved through Wabash, the Classes that followed in our wake were the Class of 1982, the Class of 1983, and the Class of 1984.

To tie this together then, my conversation with Richard meant that the Seniors he knew were the Class of 1982, those Sigs that I had the pleasure of recruiting, along with Mel Gore, as Co-Rush Chairmen. This included, among others, Dr. Stephen H. Webb. It was such a completely different perspective on the men we both know, reference points really for how we knew them, that made our conversation so great. His perspective on the men he knew, and thought of as Seniors and all that meant, was so different from my perspective on the men I knew, and will always first think of, as Freshmen.

It made for such a wonderful conversation, and made me think, Class letters cut across classes. My goal for 2024 is to figure out how to bring those perspectives to these conversations.

On November 20th I attended my first "After the Bell" session. These are sessions that offer alumni the opportunity to "come back to Wabash" for discussion by faculty on a variety of topics. The one I attended was entitled "After the Bell – Founding Wabash". It was a presentation by Wabash Archivist Nolan Eller '11 who provided a glimpse into the founders, and the creation of Wabash, via materials contained in the Robert T. Ramsay, Jr. Archival Center at Wabash College. It was fascinating to see how much original material is found in the archives, particularly Edmund Hovey's materials. Nolan did a masterful job with the presentation.



There were 39 attendees including Rolland Strasser:

He let me know he is now living in CT and that Hovey's grandson went to Yale and was very influential at the Museum of Natural History in New York City.

At the end of the session, I did ask Nolan how he missed weaving into his discussion the expulsion of Basil Barrickman.

This confused Nolan and the moderator Emily Vetne (who did a terrific job managing the event and the QnA!).

But there were enough of the crowd who remembered Barrickman's Revenge that my question drew some laughter and some nice words from John Kerezy '77. And I did give a thumbnail sketch of the birth of Barrickman's since it involved the Lilly Archives.

I highly recommend the "After the Bell" series. In fact, of note for our class, the next one will be presented by Emeritus Professor Warren Rosenberg who arrived at Wabash in 1980.
