Paul Onstad passed away September 1st.

Paul James Onstad, Jr. passed away peacefully at home on Sunday, September 1. He was preceded in death by his father, Paul James Onstad and mother, Doris Muriel Akers Onstad; his brother Peter; and his niece Emily Onstad. He is survived by siblings John [Betty], Elizabeth, Mary and Mark [Vicki]; seven nieces and one nephew; and three great-nieces and three greatnephews. Paul was born July 8, 1941 in Fargo, North Dakota. He graduated from Fargo Central High School in 1959 and attended Yale University, Wabash College and North Dakota State University, graduating [from the latter] with a B.A. in music. He received an M.A. in architectural history from the University of Virginia, and an M.A. in music from the University of New Mexico. He spent his entire career with the U.S. government in Washington, D.C., first as an architectural historian with the Office of Historic Preservation, and later as a leasing officer with the Public Building Service (both General Services Administration). His home was Arlington, VA from 1979 until his death. Paul had many talents and passions: first and foremost was music. He played several instruments, including the piano, organ, harpsichord, viola de gamba, bassoon and recorder. He was a semi-professional musician—playing in classical ensembles, conducting church choirs, and composing. He brought together family and friends to play music during the holidays, special events, and anytime he had a new piece of music to try out. Paul's creative energy also showed up in his cooking and home decorating skills. His meals and table-settings were legendary, and he loved cooking a meal and presenting it with drama and flair. He also had a part-time home-decorating business. As the family historian, and surrogate parent for his four



younger siblings, Paul created the "culture" of the Onstad family. He was our "pied piper" leading impromptu family concerts, play-readings, cooking adventures, and museum outings. He had a deep love for all his siblings and was very protective and affectionate with the four younger ones. A big thank you to Paul's friend David Lewis, who lovingly provided care as his health deteriorated, The Reverend Canon Jonathan and Mary Ostman, and Scylla Stanton—who were supportive and caring friends to the end—and his pastor, Father Carleton Clarke, who provided sacramental care. Douglas Arthur Fisher of Oxford, PA, died peacefully on Thanksgiving day, November 28, 2019. Doug was born on July 13, 1942, to Ralph and Ruth Fisher in Battle Creek, MI. He grew up the eldest of three in Indiana and Michigan. After graduating from Wabash College in 1964, he moved west to UC Davis where he received a PhD in Botany in 1968. Doug's career included time as a professor, as a manager of a research publishing company (BIOSIS), and as an independent timber-milling operator where he made fine wood boards from trees around the Southeast Pennsylvania area. Some of Doug's fondest memories were spending time in Houghton Lake Michigan as a boy with his grandfather and later as a father with his sons and extended family. Another annual highlight for Doug over the years was a week-long ski trip with friends to different ski resorts around the country. At home, Doug sang in the Choir at Westminster Presbyterian Church, donated his time to Habitat for Humanity, played bridge with an extended group, and loved a good steak or hamburger. Doug is survived by his wife Barbara, his sister Susie, his two sons David and Nathan and their spouses, Barbara's children Brian Donahue and Angie Allen, and six grandchildren (Tad, Skye, Talia, Nadia, Kylie, and Zach). He is predeceased by his parents Ralph and Ruth and his sister Barbara. A Memorial service will be planned at a later date at Ware Presbyterian Village. Doug's love of family and hearty laugh will be missed.
