Clicking on this hyperlink: <http://www.wabash.edu/50reunionform/> will take you to the site & let you enter your information. You can write as much or as little as you'd like in each category. Try it; you'll see what I'm saying. Unused categories will simply be deleted by the "system" (actually by the College's Kim Johnson).

At the bottom of the form you'll have a chance to include up to 3 photos, including one with your spouse, if possible. When you click on a "browse" (there is a "browse" button for each of the pictures you could attach), you will be taken to your own directory of files, among which you might well have some photos you'd like to share. Recent photos would be best, but, actually, anything will work.

I've scanned & attached four bios from last year's memory book, so you can see the range of possibilities.

If you elect to submit your biography manually, the form on the last page will give us the same information. Please be sure to include photos (electronically in JPG format) or in hard copy (for scanning.)

This is your chance to say something nice about yourself, to explain yourself, to share an insight, or simply to let your classmates know what you've been up to. In a sense, you can write your own "obituary." And you WILL have to write your own; the only way to escape here is to pass away - then your living unit reps and / or someone from the College will do what they can to represent you.

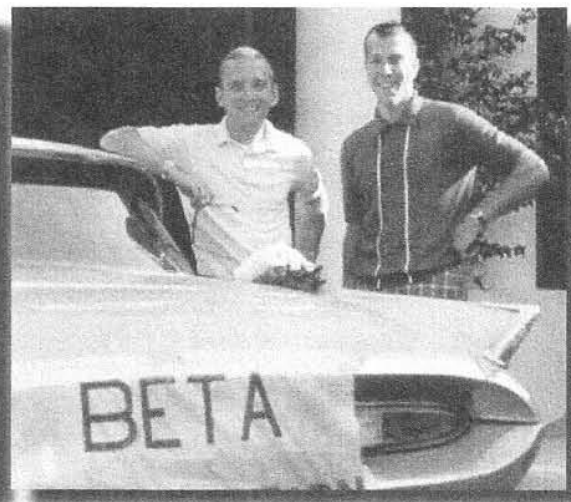


Volunteer/Avocational activities I have enjoyed: I have written several books and remains active in my Baltimore neighborhood.

Spouse/Partner/Family: I must first preface this memory book comment with a slight observation. I feel, sort of, like I am writing, in a "blue book" for Burt Stern, my obituary. It, however, has no erasures, pencil smudges, cigarette ashes and hopefully no or very few misspellings or gross grammatical errors – unlike my musings at Wabash. With my history and memories bared for all, it certainly will save someone a lot of work sometime... hopefully long in the future. That said... here goes... I have been married to Phyd (my wonderful friend, counselor and advisor) for 45 years with three great kids: Kirsten, Leah & Colin. All the kids are gainfully employed around the US and world. They have delightful husbands, wives and in the trend of the day, significant others. They have given us three wonderful grandchildren: Hensley 3, Bridger 3 and Heston 1.

Education since Wabash: Following Wabash I entered IU School of Dentistry. Following a one year layoff for TB (see below in "Wabash days" for the rest of the story), school was completed without a hitch. Vietnam had heated up so marriage and entering a residency program seemed a prudent choice. Marion County General Hospital and the IU Med Center answered my needs for a residency in oral and maxillofacial surgery. That completed, I joined my father in his practice in Indianapolis and did in fact, avoid the military.

Work/Career/Professional: I practiced oral and maxillofacial surgery with my father until his death in 1971. Then, after a few years, several partners joined me. Eventually we put together a large single specialty practice in Indy of 15 Docs in 9 offices. Reputedly we are the largest of its kind in the US. I practiced with this group and served as its president for several years, retiring in 2006 after 35 years. I really enjoyed working with patients, residents, colleagues and staff. It was an evolutionary career, steady, with regular advances of technique, technology and treatment. It required attention to detail, mental discipline, education, critical analysis of treatment options and capital investment during my whole career.

I most enjoyed giving back to our community working with dental students and surgery residents. We have also done volunteer surgery in Indy free clinics and missions to third world countries: Haiti, El Salvador & Ukraine. Proudly this will endure and help provide quality leadership in my specialty for years to come. Most notably I have been president of several oral and maxillofacial societies and the Indiana and Indianapolis Dental Associations. One special recognition was my selection to give the commencement address to our son's graduating class from The Indiana University School of Dentistry. It was a wonderful experience.

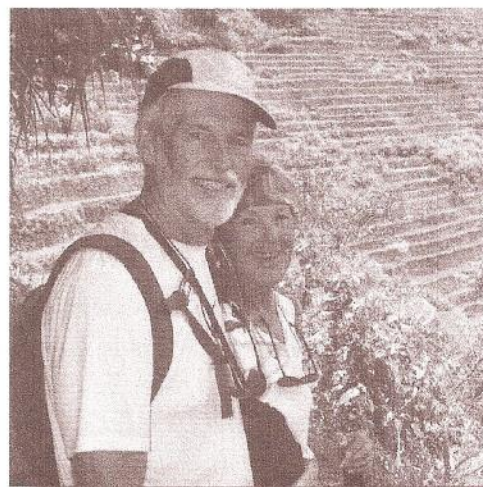
