Rogge Hall and Lodge

Rogge Hall and the adjoining lodge are part of the Residential Life District on the west side of campus and were opened in 2016. The buildings feature a total of 56 beds in a variety of room and suite configurations, including single and double rooms, as well as three- and four-man suites. Additional features of the Hall and lodge include a connected seating area, a family room, study and meeting spaces, and a shared kitchen. There are also common outdoor patio areas and a barbecue for residents' use. Rogge Hall is named in memory of Professor of Economics and Dean of the College, Benjamin A. Rogge H'53, LHD '79, who taught at Wabash College from 1949 to 1980.

Campus News

In case you missed the communication on an Insiders' Look at Wabash's 2016-2017 Fiscal Year, here is information from **Kevin M Andrews '10**, Director of Annual Giving and Advancement Services

Friends,

You made an impact on Wabash and its students this past fiscal year. Your involvement on the 4.19 Day of Giving and during the end of our fiscal year strengthened student experiences, scholarships and financial aid, programs, and faculty and staff support.

2016-2017 Annual Giving Outcomes:

- The Annual Fund finished the year at \$3.274 million—an increase of nearly \$150,000. Not only does this have an immediate impact on students' lives and the College's operations, but a \$1,000 gift to the Annual Fund has an equivalent dollar impact on the College's budget as a \$20,000 gift to the endowment.
- The Annual Fund had a record 5,922 alumni, parents, spouses, partners, students, faculty, staff, and friends make an unrestricted gift. This is an increase of over 600 people, showing the Wabash Community's commitment to enhancing the culture of philanthropy.

- 5,132 alumni made a gift (unrestricted or otherwise) last year, which is another new record.
- 639 individuals made an Annual Fund gift of \$1,000 or more.
- Wabash finished with a participation rate of 43.9%—an increase that will get us in or near the Top 10 of all nationally-ranked liberal arts colleges. Participation rates are used by grants, foundations, and others to determine the health of an institution and to measure student satisfaction.
- Wabash's 4.19 Day of Giving raised a total of \$887,000 from 3,386 individuals through 4,250 gifts—all Wabash records. If you were to take the total raised and divide it by the number of students on campus, 4.19 had an average impact of \$1,000 on each student. Based on our research, the next closest impact from a day of giving was by Purdue—a \$700 impact on each student.
- Led by the Sons of Wabash, current students took it upon themselves to organize, to strategize, and to execute a plan to reach one hundred percent student giving on 4.19.
- While the Class of 1967 stole the show with their \$9.6 million gift for their 50th reunion, the Class of 2007 broke a 10-year reunion record for their giving participation (46%) and the Class of 2012 broke a 5-year reunion record for number of donors (87).
- The Class of 2015 made a statement by, for the second year in a row, having the second highest number of alumni donors of any class with 110 alumni making a gift.

I hope you feel proud of how you made a positive and lasting difference on students' lives this past year. As we turn our attention to 2017-2018, look for more information and future ways to get involved as we try to grow Annual Giving and expand who supports it.

I would like to add my **Thanks** to all of you who made a contribution to Wabash. Obviously, most of you believe in our Alma Mater, as evidence by the recordsetting check our class presented to President Hess at Our 50th. Many campus folks commented to me how much the Gift is appreciated.
