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Wabash Rankings

Wabash Ranks Prominently in U.S. News Rankings

Wabash College once again finds itself in the Top Tier of National Liberal Arts Colleges as ranked by *U.S. News & World Report* in its annual Best Colleges rankings, which were released Monday. Data was collected on more than 1,900 colleges and universities in the report.

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The College was ranked No. 21 nationally by *U.S. News* as a Best Value School, a measure of both academic quality and cost, which was the highest value ranking for any school in the state. Further, Wabash was ranked 23rd among all National Liberal Arts Colleges for Best Undergraduate Teaching.

These rankings come on the heels of Wabash being named one of U.S. News places Wabash in the top tier of national liberal arts colleges, the best institutions for undergraduate education by *The Princeton Review* in its 2021 listing of the top 386 schools nationally, ranking No. 4 for the "Most Accessible Professors" and No. 8 for "Professors Get High Marks." The College also received high marks for "Great Financial Aid (No. 17)," "Best Class Experience (No. 19)," and "Best-Run Colleges (No. 20)."

Additionally, Wabash was one of 40 schools nationally included in the bestselling book, *Colleges That Change Lives: 40 Schools That Will Change the Way You Think About Colleges*.
