I received this note from Bruce Gras:



Hi Jim, just a quick update. Basically, it's a case of "Found and Lost, and somewhat Found again." I have had to fight a two front war since last March. In February, I was feeling fine. Then, I got hit by not one, but two Mack trucks. First, my cancer has crept back into Stage 1. Second, I have had four heart attacks in the same period. I have been hospitalized eight times since March too. I even had a stent put in my left ventricle in June to clear a 90% blockage. It didn't make much difference. All in all, I was still sinking pretty fast.

Then, I got a new cardiologist. He went over all my labs and imagery, did some more of his own, and concluded that my right ventricle was in even greater need of a stent with a 95+ blockage. So, last week, he inserted a stent there too. Now, I feel

reborn already in this first week after the procedure. Next up? Beat the cancer (again). Maybe, I need a new oncologist too?

Hope all is well with you and the family. I love the pic updates of the boys and their baseball activities.





When looking for a new assistant wrestling coach, Wabash College head coach <u>Brian Anderson</u> could not find a better fit than <u>Josh Hardman</u>.

Hardman takes over the assistant coaching position vacated by Danny Irwin, who was named head coach at Wheeling Jesuit University after nine years with the Little Giants' program.




Hardman comes to Wabash from Morningside College in Iowa. He served three season with the Mustangs as an assistant coach, helping the program post winning numbers each year and earn a second-place finish in the Great Plains Athletic Conference last season.

Hardman has been reunited with Anderson after the two competed as teammates at Manchester College. Hardman graduated from Manchester in 2000 with a Bachelor's Degree of Science. He earned a Master's Degree in sports pedagogy from South Dakota State where he spent two seasons as an assistant coach.

"This is an awesome opportunity for the Wabash wrestling program," Anderson said. "Coach Hardman was a college teammate of mine, and I've followed where he's been since we graduated. He's been a lot of different places and has learned from a lot of great coaches. He fits our program perfectly. To be able to reunite with a college teammate and to get to work with one of your best friends is going to be an awesome experience."

In addition to his time at Morningside and South Dakota State, Hardman spent four years as head coach at Dakota Wesleyan University where he was also director of the sports management program.




