Details For Our 50th Reunion: September 10-12 And Reasons To Attend It

The Class of 1971 will celebrate our 50th anniversary of our graduation. Covid has disrupted the normal plans for a reunion.

We will celebrate two days, Friday and Saturday, and perhaps have a breakfast for Sunday morning. The Friday night events are planned by our class, and the college has organized the events for Saturday.

More than 30 classmates have already registered for one or both days. Most of them registered for two people, so I am looking forward to seeing a lot the ladies,

several of whom have been to several of our past reunions.

Friday, September 10

The Class of 1971 will have a panel discussion on student life in 1967-1971. It is scheduled to start at 4 p.m. A banquet for our class will start at 6 p.m., but that might be moved somewhat later in the evening. Some of the timing relates to who and how many sign up for it.

The panel consists of Keith Nelson '71, David Blix '70, Dr. Raymond Williams, Dr. David Hadley, Alex Miller '71, and Trey Holland '71. There are two fraternity men, two independents, and two faculty members of that era (both later named honorary alumni). David Blix is also a current faculty member.

3:00 p.m. - 3:45p.m. – Colloquium. This presentation may not be finalized yet, but it is likely to be focusing years relevant to the Classes of 1970 and 1971.

4:00 p.m. - 5:00 p.m. - Living Units Open for Visits.

5:30 p.m. - Reunion Banquet (All). We want to have as many fellows as possible as the college will recognize us as a graduating class of 50 years. I believe the Class of 1970 will be recognized, too. I am working on a venue for us to gather after this banquet.
