# News from the College

The **Giant Steps** Capital campaign continues with great energy. \$175MM has been raised in its first year against a goal of \$225MM. Annual Fund dollars raised for last fiscal year was \$3.4MM, with 5,155 alumni donors, working out to be a percentage of 43.5% participation. Our Class participation is close to that level of participation, and always is solid. I know we'll continue as we get closer to our 50<sup>th</sup> Reunion, where we will present a check to Wabash representing all our efforts. More on that later.

The number of Capital Projects (facilities) going on at Wabash is remarkable!

- **>Student Housing**: major renovation updates for Lambda Chi, FIJI, Beta and Theta Delt fraternities...
- >Lilly Library: Major renovations (the last renovation was 1991!); transition from a print-based resource center to academic engagement and technology hub; Converting space for group study, tutoring and technology.
- >"Gateway Project": New Front Door to the College. Beautiful new entrance, including original Class of 1898 steps and pillars. It was dedicated to Rem

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Johnston ('55), and was completed October 4<sup>th</sup> of this year.

- >New Little Giant Football Stadium: \$13MM project, (totally funded by an anonymous donor.) Seating for 3,500 fans; new field turf, new track, more restrooms, relocated scoreboard, "Hall of Giants" tunnel to the field; Handicapped accessible, with elevator; field to be named for Coach Frank Navarro. Will open September 5<sup>th</sup>, 2020.
- >Other renovations: President Hess told us many of the College's buildings are in great need of basic updates in terms of air conditioning, heating, electrical, etc...

So, the next time we all visit Wabash, we all will see lots of changes, but all in keeping with the traditional look and values of Wabash.

**Monon Bell Classic.** The 126<sup>th</sup> meeting of Wabash and Depauw will take place in Greencastle on November 16<sup>th</sup>. The two teams first met on the gridiron in 1890. In 1932, a locomotive bell from the Chicago, Indianapolis and Louisville Railroad Company, also known as the Monon Line, was donated and became the winner's trophy each year. In the all-time series, Wabash holds a 62-54-9 lead.

FOX Sports Indiana and FOX Sports Midwest will again televise the Monon Bell Classic. 2019 marks the third consecutive year viewers around the nation will be able to see the action on FSI, and this year the game will also be televised nationally on FOX College Sports Atlantic, and streamed on FOX Sports GO.

# News from '72

# Lots of news from you, and I greatly apologize for the lateness of most of these updates!

**Larry Zommick** reports he's retired and has taken (or is taking) many courses at the University of Washington, including Modern and Biblical Hebrew, Philosophy, Anthropology and Music.

**Dan Grube** sent me lots of info last year. "6 years ago (February 2013) my wife of almost 40 years, Mikki, died rather suddenly. I have a son, Adam, who is now 45, and who is practicing Law in Germany. I have a 43 year old daughter, Amber, who has produced three incredible grandchildren. So I now have a 22 year old grandson, a 16 year old granddaughter, and a 14 year old grandson."

"For the last 21 years, I've been singing Bass in an all-male chorus called The Cold Spring Area Männerchor (German for Men's Chorus), where I've been a Board Member, Secretary, Treasurer, Performance Manager, among other things. I've done three concert tours in Europe, one in Canada, and in February, 2017 performed at Carnegie Hall, in New York. "In May of 2017, I moved from Saint Cloud, Minnesota (population about 65,000) to Albany, Minnesota (population about 3000), when, at age 67, I took on a 30 year mortgage. That's either the height of optimism or folly depending upon your point of view. I like the slower pace!"

Good to see them there and looking forward to our 50th for Wabash." "I'm still practicing full time but I'm taking a lot of time off to go to our house in Naples to play golf and spend time with the kids and grandkids.

Carol and I are building a downsize house now after 20 years in our too big house for two people. We've now been married 46 years and have 7 grandkids with 2 in high school. Our kids are all married with kids and two live here but my son John lives in Chicago working for Morningstar and has two children 4 and 2."

"I still love working since I've stopped taking care of football teams and finally gave up doing Purdue this year after 36 years. I still take care of the Wabash kids and still support the school wrestling program. We have 50 kids on the wrestling team and our kids are doing well in school. When I was there we had 5 of us go to medical school and I'm trying to get the program at the same level academically again and it's working." Thanks, Don.

Speaking of Dr. Shelbourne, he was honored earlier this year by receiving the Indianapolis Association of Wabash Men's "**Man-of-the Year**" award, for all his career work in orthopaedic sports medicine. As reported in a news release by the College, his son Brian '12, delivered a heartfelt description of a father, friend, mentor, and surgeon. "Unbelievable," was how Don described it after the fact, "I'm going to get emotional again, if I keep thinking about it."

- >Richard (Dick) Stout passed away last year in Ormonde Beach, Florida. Hugh McClelland sent me this note last year: "Sigma Chi fraternity brothers Billy Nielsen, Dave Garbison, Rod Kenley, Eric Garrard, Ed Powers, Ed Wright and I attended a 'Celebration of Life' gathering in Frankfort, IN last September." "Suffice to say, Dick was one of a kind and will be missed, but the legend lives on, certainly in the minds of his fraternity brothers!" He was behind the honor given to my family recognizing my Dad and Grandfather's lifelong contributions to the College through the dedication of the Fobes Lounge in Sparks Center in 1972.
