In this regard, President Feller also reported that the College's endowment now exceeds \$400 million for the first time in its history. The Dean of Advancement also reported to us that our annual alumni financial support, per student, ranks Wabash College #1 in the country.

I suppose I speak for many of us when I say that Wabash College had a life changing impact on me. I vividly remember visiting with my grandfather, Wabash College Class of 1937, during 1983. I was spending a week with him in Longboat Key, Florida. Our classmate, Dr. Tim Smith, was staying with his parents down on Siesta Key. Tim and I knew each other through high school sports. Reflecting on his time at Wabash, my Grandpa Shepard said to Tim and me that, "Wabash didn't give me all the answers, it taught me how to find the answers. For that, I have always been grateful." When my grandpa spoke those lines, he was 68 years old. Now, at almost 56, I know what he meant and I feel the same way. For most of us, those were impactful and, perhaps, even sacred years. In these challenging times, we need places like Wabash College to continue to thrive in its role of educating "men to think critically, act responsibly, lead effectively, and live humanely" in a difficult world. (The last four words were appropriately added by President Feller in his inauguration speech). This takes our committed and continuing support in all its forms: financial, referring students, and spreading "the fame of her honored, name, Wherever the breezes blow."
