## **HONORS WON**

Basketball holds a special place in the Hoosier State. The State of Indiana has produced some of the greatest stories in the history of the hardwood, and Wabash College has played an important role in shaping the state's basketball lore. Way back in 1897, Wabash basketball won its first intercollegiate game against Purdue, and the program has never looked back. This year, the Little Giants added another chapter to the basketball history books by finishing their season at the NCAA Division III Final Four.

The Little Giants started the season strong. Even before their impressive tournament run, the 2021-2022 season proved memorable. Back in January during a game against Wooster, senior guard Jack Davidson became the all-time scoring leader for the college. Later in the season at the NCAC tournament, Wabash defeated Wooster again in overtime to win the NCAC Tournament Championship Game. Junior forward Ahmoni Jones scored the final six point, all from the free-throw line, in the final 21 seconds of overtime to propel Wabash to victory. The win marked Wabash basketball's first-ever NCAC Tournament Championship.

Wabash College named Dr. Todd McDorman the new Dean of the College. Previously, Dr. McDorman taught Rhetoric before serving as the acting Dean of the College for the last two years. A pillar of the Wabash Community, Dr. McDorman began teaching at Wabash in 1998. Dr. McDorman has a long list of accomplishments that would make any Little Giant proud. He served as chair of the Rhetoric Department, faculty advisor to the Board of Trustees, and chaired the Undergraduate Research Committee. Congratulations to Dr. McDorman.

#### **CULTURE AND TRADITIONS**

Even during his precollegiate days, Pete Vaughan's athletic destiny intertwined with Wabash's. A native of Crawfordsville, IN, Pete attended Crawfordsville High School. Born Robert Edward Vaughan, "Pete" earned his nickname when his high school basketball coach dubbed him "P.D.Q." P.D.Q. ironically proved too time consuming to say, so people shorted his nickname to Pete.

Between 1903 to 1907, Wabash basketball had a legendary run of success winning 66 of 69 games. The Little Giants won the national Championship at home against Yale in 1906. The team lost only three games in four years: one to Purdue and two to Crawfordsville High School. Yes, you read that right...Crawfordsville High School led by its young star, Pete Vaughan, beat a nearly invincible Little Giants basketball team not once, but twice.

Pete attended Notre Dame before transferring to Princeton and played football at both universities. He became head basketball coach at Purdue in 1912 before leaving the position to join the US Army. After the end of World War I,

Pete returned to his hometown to coach the Little Giants basketball team from 1919 to 1940 and later as the head coach of the Wabash College football team from 1919 to 1945 and as coach of the track and field team from 1943 to 1946. During his illustrious career at the college, Pete coached the Little Giants basketball team to victory in the first ever national intercollegiate basketball tournament.

In 1938, Pete Vaughan received the last honorary Master of Arts degree granted by Wabash College. Later in 1954, Wabash College made Pete an honorary alumnus. Some Little Giant.
