As a result, we experienced longer turnaround times for tests administered on Monday and we had to switch surveillance testing of the general student population from Tuesday to Thursday due to the heavy snowfall. But, just as we have seen throughout the year, our community stepped up. Thank you to everyone who braved the weather to administer or take tests, and a special shout-out to Sodexo Campus Services for the Herculean effort required to clear that much snow in brutally cold temperatures.

When we compete in athletics, our teams bring a WAF attitude no matter the score, but we all know that singing "Old Wabash" is extra sweet after a win by the Little Giants. This week's surveillance testing was a crushing victory! We administered a record number of tests and are pleased to report a 0.0% positivity rate from surveillance testing. Congratulations, gentlemen! But don't fool yourself into thinking COVID is vanquished. We did have a student in quarantine develop the disease, reminding us that the virus is endemic on campus and why it is important to strictly adhere to our isolation and quarantine program.

Your commitment to wearing masks, watching your distance, washing your hands, and avoiding crowds and close contact is paying off. Many colleges and universities are struggling to contain outbreaks right now, so your diligence in doing the right things is praiseworthy. Keep up the fight, including avoiding crowds off-campus – especially at other colleges and universities.
