ONCE YOU ARE READY TO REQUEST ONE OF THESE COURSES

- Get Advisor Approval:** Discuss the course with your advisor. The Registrar's Office must receive their approval via email before you can register.
- Start Your Request:** Go to the [Wabash Academy Page](#) and click "Request Enrollment at academy.com".
- Create an Account:** If this is your first time, create an Academy account. Choose "Student Login, then click the "Sign Up" button. (*Tip: Use your Wabash log-in ID, but a different password*). Accept the Terms of Service and click Submit. If you have taken Course Share courses before, use your existing login information.
- Find Your Course:** Search for your desired summer course using the Academy Course ID listed above.
- Submit Request:** Click "Register." **Note:** This submits a *request* to register, not the final registration. Pay close attention to the start and end dates, **and the drop date**, for the course.
- Wait for Processing:** The Registrar's Office will verify your advisor's approval and coordinate your registration with the teaching institution.
- Confirmation:** Once fully approved, the course will be added to your Wabash Summer 2026 schedule. *Please allow time for processing, especially if the start date is approaching.*

IMPORTANT POINTS TO REMEMBER ABOUT COURSE SHARE

Course Share classes are taught by other institutions and are treated as **transfer courses** at Wabash.

- Grades & GPA:** You will earn credit (a "CR" grade) if you receive a C- or higher. Grades below C- receive no credit ("NC"). These courses count toward your 34 required graduation credits but **do not** affect your Wabash GPA.
- Credit Limits:** These courses count toward your maximum allowed transfer credits (see the [Academic Bulletin](#) for details).
- Distribution Requirements:** You may apply a maximum of one Course Share credit or other transfer credit toward any Wabash distribution requirement that requires multiple credits.
- Host Institution Rules Apply:** Because another institution teaches the course, you are bound by their policies:
 - Drop Dates:** You must follow the teaching institution's drop dates, which may differ from Wabash's. Drop dates for each course are listed above. **They are different than Wabash's summer drop dates.** You are financially responsible for the course if you drop after **their** deadline.
 - Learning Systems:** You must use the host school's learning management system (e.g., Canvas, Blackboard). They will provide the necessary resources.
 - Grade Disputes:** Any grade changes or challenges must follow the teaching institution's official procedures.

COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

BUAD 201, Principles of Financial Accounting

Principles of Financial Accounting is the first of a two-semester course designed to introduce the student to accounting principles.

BUAD 202, Principles of Managerial Accounting

Principles of Managerial Accounting is the second of a two-semester course designed to introduce the student to accounting principles.

ART 106, Introduction to Art History II

An introduction to art history, surveying important works with attention to their historical and cultural contexts, this course covers the early Renaissance through the 19th century.

COM 330, Database Concepts and Programming

This course introduces the student to the use of a database management system to provide the software and database necessary to upgrade a DBMS system. Database structures, applications, network, relational and hierarchical data models, application program development, query systems, file security, and the role of the database administrator will be studied. Course fee may apply.

WRT 120A, Introduction to Creative Writing

A course introducing students to the craft of creating fiction, poetry, creative nonfiction and drama. In this course we will explore the various techniques, decisions, styles and approaches used by creative writers. Students will also read extensively and participate in exercises designed to develop the creative process.

PHST 315, Public Health & Epidemiology

Provides an overview of the basic principles of public health and their application to the development of activities that benefit the health status of populations. Concepts of epidemiology, biostatistics, and health care planning, policy development and assessment are also examined.

HIST 106, United States History since 1877

Deals with the period 1877 to the present, emphasizing the development of the United States as an industrial and a world power.

MA 253, Statistics

Topics include: laws of probability, frequency distributions, sampling, expectation and variance, normal and sampling distributions, hypothesis testing, least squares, point, and interval estimates of parameters.

MATU 103, Applied Mathematics

This course presents contemporary and historical topics in mathematics from problem solving, humanities, and business. Students will explore mathematical concepts by applying quantitative problem solving methods to sets, cryptanalysis, number systems, geometry, art, probability, statistics, voting methods, fair division, economics, and finance topics in a real-world context.

MUSU 222, Musical Cultures of the World

A survey of nonwestern musical traditions with focus on Africa, Asia and Latin America.

PSY 240, Abnormal Psychology

Abnormal Psychology is largely concerned with the nature, origin, and treatment of mental illness. This course offers the student a comprehensive overview of the field, focusing on the biological, psychological, relational, and social components of mental disorders. A historical and contemporary exploration of mental illnesses offers the student a broad overview of the field, while a cross-cultural examination of disorders offers students insight to how mental illness is viewed from various perspectives.

RELG 356, Death & Dying in World Religions

Studies the ways various religions deal with death and dying. Attention is paid to beliefs and practices of contemporary religious practitioners.

HUMN 246, Film Appreciation

This course is an introduction to the art of film intended to enable students to become more knowledgeable, appreciative and critical viewers. The course covers the major areas of film: narrative, documentary, animated and experimental. While some film history is covered, this course emphasizes understanding key elements in the filmmaking process: scripting, filming, editing, acting, directing, promoting and distributing. Students will be required to view and write critical reviews of films screened both in and out of class.

CME 229, Storytelling for the Screen

This course explores various approaches to screen-based storytelling in film, television, and new media environments with a focus on short form development. Topics include story ideation, character development, theme, and scene structure.
